A standout moment was when our pupils were awarded Best Digital Innovation for their fantastic idea: a mobile app designed to manage and

# YEAR 10 COMPUTER SCIENCE TRIP TO THE NORTH WEST COMPUTER SCIENCE MUSEUM

#### Dear Parents,

We hope this letter finds you well. As members of the Preston Community Safety Partnership, we are reaching out to address a concern within Preston that requires your attention and cooperation.

Empty buildings in Preston have been attracting children and young people who may sometimes find open access where damage has been caused to doors, windows and security boarding. If a building is found open to access, please report this to Preston City Council so that it can be secured (contact details for reports can be found below).

The curiosity and sense of adventure these places might provoke could tempt young people to want to explore but it is crucial to highlight the serious dangers associated with entering empty buildings.

Empty buildings are normally secured to prevent access and boarded up doors and windows and locks and chains on gates mean that the building shouldn't be entered, gates and scaffolding shouldn't be climbed.

#### The Dangers:

- Structural Instability: Empty buildings are often in a state of disrepair, with
  weakened floors, ceilings, and walls that can collapse without warning. This poses a
  significant risk of injury or even fatality to anyone inside. Some roofs are not capable
  of supporting the weight of a person and a person walking on a roof may cause it to
  collapse.
- Hazardous Materials: These buildings may contain hazardous materials such as asbestos, broken glass, sharp metal, and other debris that can cause serious injuries or health issues.
- Electrical Hazards: Exposed wiring and damaged electrical systems within these buildings can lead to severe electrical shocks or fires.
- Gas Leaks: Gas supplies to empty buildings may not have been safely disconnected and where leaks occur gas can accumulate to dangerous levels inside.
- Presence of Unwanted Individuals: Abandoned buildings can sometimes become havens for illicit activities or squatters, potentially exposing your children to unsafe and undesirable situations.

#### Advice for Parents:

 Educate Your Children: Talk to your children about the dangers of entering empty buildings. Explain why these places are unsafe and the potential risks involved.



- Monitor Their Activities: Be aware of where your children are spending their time, especially during evenings, weekends and holidays. Encourage them to stay in safe, supervised areas.
- Encourage Safe Alternatives: Promote engagement in safe and supervised activities such as sports, community clubs, or local youth groups. These provide constructive ways for children to explore and socialise.
- Report Suspicious Activity: If you notice children entering or loitering around empty buildings, please report it to local authorities. Your vigilance can prevent accidents and ensure the safety of our community's youth.
- Stay Informed: Keep up to date with local news and announcements from the Preston Community Safety Partnership regarding any measures being taken to secure and manage empty buildings in the area.

We are committed to ensuring the safety and well-being of our children and young people. Your cooperation and proactive involvement are essential in helping us address this issue effectively. Let us work together to create a safer environment for all.

Buildings which appear to be in a dangerous condition or are open to unauthorised access should be reported to Preston City Council.

Dear Parents, Carers and Guardians,

I write with regards to a significant increase in the use of E-Bikes, E-Scooters, E-Motorbikes and Off-Road Motorcycles used by our young people in Lancashire. With the impending summer holidays, I would expect to see an increase in their use on our roads and in turn there will be an increase in Police activity.

Therefore, I have provided an information leaflet to educate on the legalities of these machines, where they can be ridden and the penalties if stopped by Police.

For context, we have seen a significant increase in collisions involving these machines, not only in Lancashire but nationally. Anti-Social Behaviour from these vehicles are one of the most reported matters to the Police and we are looking to reduce this by listening to what effects our communities the most. These machines are subject to thefts and robberies and are often used to facilitate criminal activity by some and in some areas.

I appreciate that the majority of our young people see riding as a fun activity, but I would urge them to do so lawfully with your support. By understanding the legalities and working together I would hope to see safer roads, less injuries with a decrease in crime and ASB.

I thank you for your understanding and hope you and our young people can enjoy a fun and safe summer period before going back to school.

# E-SCOOTERS & E-BIKES


A guide for parents, carers & professionals

#### Where can you use an e-scooter/bike

- Only on private land with the landowner's permission
- Not on roads, pavements, cycle anes, car parks, or any public space.

#### Did you know?

In the last 12 months e-bikes, e-scooters and electric dirt bikes have been involved in 6 fatal collisions in Lancashire



#### The law & consequences

- E-scooters/bikes can be classed as motor vehicles under the Road Traffic Act 1988
- They require a valid driving licence and insurance to be used legally on public roads
- No licence or insurance? Your e-scooter/e-bike can be seized under Section 165a.

#### If you are prosecuted

- Riding with no licence? You'll receive 3 penalty points and a minimum of a £100 fine
- Riding with no insurance? You'll receive 6 penalty points and a minimum of a £300 fine
- Penalty points will be held on a 'Ghost Licence' by the DVLA
- These points will carry over to your future licence and could result in an instant disqualification
- Your insurance costs may significantly increase for years and you may be sent to court.

### YPES OF E-BIKES & E-SCOOTERS



#### E-SCOOTER











Personal Light Electric Vehicle (PLEV) Includes powered unicycles, go peds and hoverboards.

#### There are two types:


- Privately owned
- Rented through an authorised scheme.

An E-scooter is legal for use on the roads only if rented through a government trial scheme in a designated area (conditions apply).



#### **EAPC**





#### Only Legal for use on the roads if:

- Propelled by pedals
- · Doesn't exceed max output of 250w
- · Cuts off electric assistance over 15.5mph
- The rider is over 14 years old.



#### E-MOTORBIKE

Twist & Go (PLEV)









#### Not legal on roads unless:

- Registered with the DVLA
- Tax, insured and MOT'd
- The rider has completed a CBT (Compulsory Basic Training) and holds a provisional or full driving licence
- The rider must be wearing a motorcycle helmet.

#### Know the Rules Before You Ride

A road is classed as a:

- Highway
- Bridleway
- Footpath Cycle lane
- Grass verge Car park
