The purpose of this safeguarding policy is to ensure every child who is a registered pupil at our school is safe and protected from harm. This means we will always work to:

- Protect children and young people at our school from maltreatment;
- Prevent impairment of our children's and young people's mental and physical health or development;
- Ensure that children and young people at our school grow up in circumstances consistent with the provision of safe and effective care;
- Undertake that role so as to enable all children at our school to have the best outcomes.

This policy will give clear direction to staff, volunteers, visitors and parents about expectations and our legal responsibility to safeguard and promote the welfare of all children at our school.

Our school fully recognises the contribution it can make to protect children from harm and to support and promote the welfare of all children who are registered pupils at our school.

This policy applies to all pupils, staff, parents, governors, volunteers and visitors.

- Do all they can within the capacity of their role, to ensure that children grow up in circumstances consistent with safe and effective care
- Do all they can within the capacity of their role, to ensure that children have the best outcomes
- Report cases of suspected abuse to the DSL. This will be done as soon as possible using the school's agreed format of CPOMS (Child Protection Online Monitoring System)
- Report lower level concerns to the DSL using the school's agreed format of CPOMS
- Monitor all pupils, particularly those that are deemed vulnerable
- Report any concerns regarding any adults conduct to the DSL or Headteacher
- All staff, if they have concerns, should be acted on immediately and should always record on CPOMS to the DSL, Deputy, and Assistant. Early information sharing being vital in keeping children safe. In exceptional circumstances staff should consider speaking to a member of SLT or Children's Social Care to discuss safeguarding concerns if the DSL's are not immediately available.
- All staff will identify signs that a child is struggling with their mental health, including behaviour concerns.
- All staff will know which children are more vulnerable to developing mental health problems.
- All staff will refer mental health problems which are also a safeguarding concern to the DSL.
- All staff should be aware of the process for making referrals to children's social care and for statutory assessments under the Children Act 1989, especially section 17 (children in need) and section 47 (a child suffering, or likely to suffer, significant harm) that may follow a referral, along with the role they might be expected to play in such assessments

The Governing Body will:

- Ensure that the policies, procedures and training in St Marys are effective and comply with the law at all times
- Ensure that safeguarding policies and procedures are followed by all staff
- Put in place safeguarding responses in cases where children go missing from education
- Appoint a DSL and back-ups and ensure that they are provided with appropriate support, funding, resources and time to carry out their role
- Ensure the school or college contributes to inter-agency working in line with statutory guidance Working together to safeguard children 2018
- Ensure that safeguarding procedures take into account local guidance including Risk Management Toolkit and Lancashire Continuum of Need and Thresholds Guidance
- Ensure that staff members undergo safeguarding training at induction
- Ensure that DSLs and all staff, volunteers and Governors are trained and updated regarding safeguarding regularly in compliance with <u>Keeping Children</u> <u>Safe in Education 2020</u>
- ensure that children are safe online by ensuring that appropriate filters and monitoring systems are in place
- ensure that children are taught about safeguarding
- prevent people who pose a risk of harm from working with children
- ensure there are procedures in place to handle allegations against teachers, headteachers, principals, volunteers and other staff
- ensure staff in school are aware of, and policies reflect, an understanding of specific issues such as peer on peer abuse and safeguarding children with disabilities and special educational needs

- ensure that all practice and procedures operate with the best interests of the child at their heart
- appoint a designated teacher to promote the education of CLA
- ensure that all staff are aware of safeguarding issues and vulnerabilities associated with CLA

The DSLs will:

- take **lead responsibility** for safeguarding and child protection
- manage referrals to Children's Social Care, Police and other agencies
- work with other agencies in order to improve outcomes for children and lead on communication to all staff in regards to a vulnerable child and their educational/welfare needs
- promote educational outcomes by sharing information of the welfare, safeguarding and CP issues that all vulnerable children and young people are previously or currently experiencing with their teachers and leadership staff
- work with identified teachers to support them to identify the challenges that all vulnerable pupils may face and the additional academic support and adjustments they can make to support this cohort further
- work with staff to create and maintain a culture of high aspirations for all vulnerable pupils
- Take lead on promoting the welfare of vulnerable children those with a social worker or with mental health needs
- attend DSL training every 2 years
- undertake Prevent awareness training
- update their skills and knowledge on a regular basis, but at least annually
- raise awareness of safeguarding throughout school
- identify and respond to mental health concerns which are also a safeguarding issue, including referring to appropriate services
- will escalate all concerns and referrals and ensure accountability through robust record keeping for all mental health concerns
- Will be aware of all Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) and Child Criminal Exploitation (CCE) and consider the contextual factors (including low attendance) when undertaking or contributing assessments, including Early Help, CSE or other agency assessments
- Will receive training on CCE and CSE to enable recognition and respond to these forms of abuse including the referrals to appropriate services
- ensure that this policy is reviewed annually and is available publicly
- maintain, update and amend the school's safeguarding portfolio regularly
- ensure that parents are aware of school's responsibilities regarding safeguarding and child protection
- maintain accurate safeguarding records that are stored securely
- be available during school hours
- arrange cover of DSL role for any out of hours/out of term activities
- represent school in multi-agency meetings
- be provided with appropriate support and supervision in order to carry out the role safely and effectively
- DSLs must take a holistic view to ensure wider environmental factors are considered which may be a threat to safety and welfare of children (Contextual Safequarding).
- The DSL will consider when a child is moving school if it would be appropriate to share information in advance of the pupil moving.
- The DSL should have details and liaise with the Local Authority Personal Advisors for any Care Leavers.
- To create a vulnerable register for all pupils self-isolating during C-19

To ensure all pupils self-isolating are contacted by a key worker by both telephone communication and home visits

 To ensure that both pupils and staff are safe throughout all remote/blended learning communication to reduce vulnerability for all parties (as per the remote learning policy)

Induction, Training & Updates

St Mary's Catholic High School is committed to providing staff and volunteers with the skills and knowledge needed to safeguard children. We therefore ensure that:

All staff and volunteers will receive Level 1 Safeguarding Training on induction using LCC Safeguarding Induction Pack/ Hays Online Safeguarding training which includes Keeping Children Safe in Education (Part One), Guidance for Safer Working Practice, Code of Conduct and Whistleblowing Policy. Governors will also receive Part two of KCSiE 2021.

- Staff induction must include Child Protection Policy, Staff Behaviour Policy, Role of the DSL and Deputies, Pupil Behaviour Policy, Attendance Policy, SEND policy and Safeguarding response to children who go missing from education
- ALL staff and volunteers will receive Level 1 & 2 Safeguarding Training annually
- the DSL/s will provide ALL staff, volunteers and governors with regular safeguarding updates
- ALL staff, volunteers and governors will read and show an understanding of any updates that are provided.
- DSLs will attend DSL training every 2 years
- DSLs will update their knowledge, skills and understanding of relevant safeguarding issues on a regular basis
- the DSL and Deputy will undertake Prevent Lead awareness training, as well as all staff and governors completing the awareness training on Prevent through the HAYS ONLINE safeguarding course.
- At least one member of staff and one governor will attend Safer Recruitment Training. This will be renewed at least every 5 years
- ALL staff, volunteers and governors will undertake any additional training on matters such as Child Sexual Exploitation, Child Criminal Exploitation, Prevent, Peer on Peer abuse, Online Safety etc as is deemed necessary by KCSIE 2021
- any staff member will discuss any specific training requirements or gaps in knowledge or understanding with the DSL/s

Child Protection

St Mary's Catholic High School is committed to PREVENTING abuse, PROTECTING children from abuse and SUPPORTING those involved in cases of abuse. We therefore ensure that:

- ALL staff and volunteers understand the importance of teaching children how to keep themselves safe from all types of abuse
- ALL staff and volunteers seek out opportunities that are relevant to their role, to teach children the skills to keep themselves safe
- ALL staff and volunteers make and maintain positive and supportive relationships with children which enable children to feel safe and valued
- safeguarding has a high status throughout school by being on the agenda at staff meetings/briefings, information being readily available on notice boards, regular updates
- ALL staff feel confident in approaching DSLs to raise concerns
- ALL staff and volunteers have an understanding of the four categories of abuse;
 NEGLECT, EMOTIONAL ABUSE, SEXUAL ABUSE, PHYSICAL ABUSE.
- We will use Lancashire's Neglect Strategy 2019 and accompanying toolkit to identify and assess children whose developmental needs are being insufficiently met at an early stage, placing them at risk of achieving poor educational, emotional and social outcomes.
- Lancashire Multi-Agency Neglect Strategy, Neglect Toolkit

- ALL staff and volunteers understand that there are other ways in which children can be abused such as; Online, Child Sexual Exploitation, Female Genital Mutilation, Honour Based Violence, Radicalisation, Trafficking, Slavery, Peer Abuse, Forced Marriage and others
- ALL staff and volunteers have the knowledge, skills and expertise to recognise the signs and symptoms of all types of abuse
- All staff, if they have concerns, these should be acted on immediately: early
 information sharing being vital in keeping children safe. In exceptional
 circumstances staff should consider speaking to a member of SLT or Children's
 Social Care to discuss safeguarding concerns if the DSL is not immediately
 available.
- DSLs keep up to date with emerging and specific safeguarding issues and update training and the School's Safeguarding Portfolio accordingly
- DSLs update staff and volunteers knowledge and understanding of such issues in order for them to be able to identify children who are at risk of such specific safeguarding issues
- ALL staff and volunteers will maintain and demonstrate an attitude of "it can happen here"
- ALL staff and volunteers are child-centred in their practice and act in the best interests of the child at all times
- ALL staff recognise and understand that behaviour can be a child's way of communicating distress and changes to behaviour may be an indicator of abuse
- ALL staff and volunteers have the skills to respond appropriately and sensitively to disclosures or allegations of abuse
- ALL staff and volunteers report cases of suspected abuse to the DSL. This will be done as soon as possible using the school's agreed format of CPOMS
- where a child is at risk of immediate harm, ALL staff understand that they must refer to the Police or Children's Social Care
- DSLs will make a Section 47 referral to Children's Social Care where a child is in need of protection, has been significantly harmed or is at risk of significant harm, using <u>PAN Lancashire Continuum of Need and Thresholds Guidance</u> and Risk Management Toolkit to determine whether this threshold has been met
- this referral will be done by telephone and followed with a <u>CSC Referral Form</u> as soon as possible
- consent from parents/carers and child (if age appropriate) will be sought prior to this referral, except where this will cause delay or place anyone at risk
- where consent is not given, parents and carers are informed that a referral will still be made, except where this will cause delay or place anyone at risk
- DSLs adhere to policy, procedures and guidance from the Safeguarding Partners with regard to sharing information
- DSLs contribute to Strategy Discussions, Strategy Meetings, Initial and Review Child Protection Conferences, Core Group Meetings and other CP meetings
- DSLs or another appropriate member of staff, will attend CP meetings, produce and present reports, liaise with staff, work with parents, work with other agencies and ensure the voice of the child is evidenced throughout these processes
- DSLs meet regularly to ensure that decisions made about children who are subjects of CP Plans are agreed and a clear rationale for the decision is documented
- a copy of the child's CP Plan is included in the child's individual safeguarding file
- ALL staff and volunteers will support victims of abuse in a capacity that is relevant to their role. This will be determined by the DSL
- DSLs will determine what information staff members need to know in order to safeguard and support children. This may be different information for different staff
- staff are offered appropriate support and/or supervision that is relevant to their role or involvement in particular cases

communication and work with parents and carers will always be undertaken in a supportive manner and in the best interests of the child ALL staff understand that children who perpetrate abuse or display harmful behaviour should be treated as victims first and foremost and supported in the same way a victim of abuse would be supported specific programmes of work and support are offered to children and families who are vulnerable Risk Assessments will be undertaken where a child's behaviour poses a risk to others, themselves or the environment Child in Need St Mary's Catholic High School is committed to ensuring the appropriate level of support is offered to a "Child in Need" and their family. We therefore ensure that: DSLs will make a Section 17 referral to Children's Social Care where Early Help has not been successful in reducing risk and meeting unmet needs using PAN Lancashire Continuum of Need and Thresholds Guidance and CSC referral DSLs will make a Section 17 referral to Children's Social Care where there is evidence that the Level 3 threshold has been met on the Continuum of Need this will be determined and assessed by the DSL using the PAN Lancashire Continuum of Need and Thresholds Guidance and the Risk Management **Toolkit** DSLs will obtain parental consent for the referral and for information to be shared, prior to contacting Children's Social Care when consent is not given, DSLs will continue to offer Early Help with consent, gather evidence of engagement or lack thereof, disguised compliance, impact on the child, increase in risk or level of unmet need, improvements or deteriorations DSLs will review such cases regularly and assess whether there is evidence that meets Level 4 threshold on the Continuum of Need. In such cases Child Protection Procedures will be followed DSLs, or other appropriate member of staff, will contribute to Child in Need Meetings and Reviews DSLs, or other appropriate member of staff, will attend CiN meetings, produce and present reports, liaise with staff, work with parents, work with other agencies and ensure the voice of the child is evidenced throughout these processes DSLs will meet regularly to ensure that decisions made about children who are subjects of CiN Plans are agreed and a clear rationale for the decision is documented a copy of the child's CiN Plan is included in the child's individual safeguarding **Early Help** St Mary's Catholic High School is committed to providing our families with the right help at the right time. Any child may benefit from early help, but ALL school and college staff should be particularly alert to the potential need for early help for a child who: is disabled and has specific additional needs; has special educational needs (whether or not they have a statutory education. health and care plan); is a young carer; is showing signs of being drawn in to anti-social or criminal behaviour, including gang involvement and association with organised crime groups;

- is frequently missing/goes missing from care or from home;
- is misusing drugs or alcohol themselves;
- Is at risk of modern slavery, trafficking or exploitation;
- is in a family circumstance presenting challenges for the child, such as substance abuse, adult mental health problems or domestic abuse:
- has returned home to their family from care;
- is showing early signs of abuse and/or neglect;

- is at risk of being radicalised or exploited;
- is a privately fostered child.

We therefore ensure that:

- ALL staff and volunteers can identify the risk factors that indicate a family or pupil may benefit from Early Help
- ALL staff and volunteers will use the school's agreed format for letting the DSL know about Early Help requirements
- DSLs will undertake a CAF assessment, when appropriate, to identify what Early Help is required
- DSLs will signpost and refer to appropriate support agencies
- DSLs will lead on TAF meetings where is it appropriate for them to do so
- DSLs will utilise Children and Family Wellbeing Service using the Early Help Assessment
- DSLs will refer to CSC where Early Help has not been successful in reducing risk and meeting unmet needs using <u>PAN Lancashire Continuum of Need and</u> <u>Thresholds Guidance and CSC referral form</u>
- DSLs and other identified staff will identify and work with any organisations that are relevant in meeting the needs of pupils and their families
- DSLs and other identified staff will initiate and maintain positive and supportive relationships with parents and carers of children who may benefit from Early Help
- DSLs will be the lead for Early Help cases

Specific Safeguarding

St Mary's Catholic High School is committed to keeping our children safe from specific forms of abuse.

We will formulate risk management plans where required using the guidance and template below.

We will ensure that:

• ALL staff and volunteers understand that there are specific and emerging ways in which children can be abused, such as:

<u>Radicalisation</u> refers to the process by which a person comes to support terrorism and forms of extremism, there is no single way of identifying an individual who is likely to be susceptible to an extremist ideology.

- ALL staff and volunteers will have 'due regard to the need to prevent people from being drawn into terrorism', known as the 'Prevent Duty'
- ALL staff and volunteers will have a general understanding of how to identify a child who may be at risk of radicalisation
- ALL staff and volunteers will use professional judgement in identifying children who might be at risk of radicalisation and act proportionately
- The school <u>Online Safety Policy</u> will ensure the safety of children by ensuring they cannot access terrorist and extremist material when using the internet and that suitable filtering software is in place
- DSLs understand when it is appropriate to make a referral to the Channel Panel

Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) CSE occurs where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, manipulate or deceive a child into sexual activity (a) in exchange for something the victim needs or wants, and/or (b) for

the financial advantage or increased status of the perpetrator or facilitator. The victim may have been sexually exploited even if the sexual activity appears consensual. CSE does not always involve physical contact; it can also occur through the use of technology. CSE can affect any child or young person (male or female) under the age of 18 years, including 16 and 17 year olds who can legally consent to have sex. It can include both contact (penetrative and non-penetrative acts) and non-contact sexual activity and may occur without the child or young person's immediate knowledge (e.g. through others copying videos or images they have created and posted on social media).

- The school curriculum (whereby sexual relationships/PSCHEE is delivered) will include relevant information around the risks associated with CSE
- The school <u>Online Safety Policy</u> will ensure the safety of children by ensuring they cannot access inappropriate material when using the internet and that suitable filtering software is in place

Child criminal exploitation: county lines

CCE is where an individual or group takes advantage of an imbalance of power to coerce, control, manipulate or deceive a child into any criminal activity (a) in exchange for something the victim needs or wants, and/or (b) for the financial or other advantage of the perpetrator or facilitator and/or (c) through violence or the threat of violence. The victim may have been criminally exploited even if the activity appears consensual. CCE does not always involve physical contact; it can also occur through the use of technology. This can affect any child or young person (male or female) under the age of 18 years

- can affect any vulnerable adult over the age of 18 years
- can still be exploitation even if the activity appears consensual
- can involve force and/or enticement-based methods of compliance and is often accompanied by violence or threats of violence
- can be perpetrated by individuals or groups, males or females, and young people or adults; and
- is typified by some form of power imbalance in favour of those perpetrating the exploitation. Whilst age may the most obvious, this power imbalance can also be due to a range of other factors including gender, cognitive ability, physical strength, status, and access to economic or other resources.

<u>Honour Based Violence (HBV)</u> 'A crime or incident, which has or may have been committed, to protect or defend the honour of the family and/or community'. (ACPO Working Definition 2008) ALL staff and volunteers will have a general understanding of how to identify a child who may be at risk of Honour Based Violence.

Forced Marriage is one whereby one or both parties do not consent to marriage but are forced to do so through violence, threats or any form of coercion. Schools play an important role in safeguarding children from being forced to marry.

<u>Female Genital Mutilation (FGM)</u> is encompassed within the term Honour Based Violence:

- ALL staff and volunteers are aware of the "one chance rule" and will report all cases of suspected Honour Based Violence to the DSL immediately
- FGM is illegal in the UK and a form of child abuse with long-lasting harmful consequences
- ALL staff need to be alert to the possibility of when a female pupil may be at risk of FGM or when it may have been conducted on them
- Whilst all staff should speak to the designated safeguarding lead (or deputy)
 with regard to any concerns about female genital mutilation (FGM), there is a

specific **legal** duty on **teachers**. If a **teacher**, in the course of their work in the profession, discovers that an act of FGM appears to have been carried out on a girl under the age of 18, the teacher **must** report this to the police.

<u>Modern Slavery</u> The Modern Slavery Act 2015 places a new statutory duty on public authorities, including schools, to notify the National Crime Agency (NCA) (section 52 of the Act) on observing signs or receiving intelligence relating to modern slavery. The public authority (including schools) bears this obligation where it has 'reasonable grounds to believe that a person may be a victim of slavery or human trafficking':

 Staff must be aware of the above and contact the DSL should they suspect or receive information that either parents or their children may be victims of modern slavery. The DSL should then contact the NCA

<u>Peer on Peer Abuse</u> occurs when a young person is exploited, bullied and / or harmed by their peers who are the same or similar age; everyone directly involved in peer on peer abuse is under the age of 18. Please see <u>Peer on Peer abuse Pan Lancashire</u> procedures

This is most likely to include, but may not be limited to: *bullying (including cyberbullying);* physical abuse such as hitting, kicking, shaking, biting, hair pulling, or otherwise causing physical harm; sexual violence and sexual harassment; sharing of nude images and initiation/hazing type violence and rituals.

- ALL staff and volunteers understand that children can abuse other children
- ALL staff and volunteers will inform the DSL of suspected peer abuse and record in line with schools recording policy
- All staff will listen and take every report seriously linked to all peer on peer abuse and the school has a zero tolerance approach
- Peer on peer abuse will be taken as seriously as any other form of abuse
- All staff understand that abuse is abuse and should never be tolerated or passed off as "banter", "just having a laugh" or "part of growing up
- All staff will understand that pupils with SEND are more prone to peer group isolation and school will have extra pastoral support to address this.
- Physical abuse between peers will be managed under the school's <u>Behaviour</u>
 Policy
- Emotional abuse between peers will be managed under the school's Anti-Bullying Policy
- Harmful sexual behaviour will be identified and managed using the <u>Brook</u> <u>Traffic Light Tool</u> and with support and guidance from LCC Schools Safeguarding Officer
- Sexting will be managed on a case by case basis using national and local guidance and advice from LCC Schools Safeguarding Officer – Link to Government Sexting Guidance
- In cases of suspected or actual peer on peer abuse a risk assessment will be undertaken and appropriate and proportionate control measures put in place to manage and reduce risk. Seek advice from LCC Schools Safeguarding Officer
- Referrals to Children's Social Care, Police and/or other appropriate agencies will be made where thresholds are met
- DSLs understand that regarding peer on peer abuse, the victim and the perpetrator are likely to have unmet needs and require support and assessment to determine these.
- The DSL will assess on a case-by-case basis, supported by children's social care and the police if required to ensure the most appropriate response for the children / young people involved.
- The DSL will consider:
- the wishes of the victim in terms of how they want to proceed

- the nature of the alleged incident
- the ages of the children involved
- the development stages of the children involved
- any power imbalance between the children
- is the incident a one-off or a sustained pattern of abuse
- are there ongoing risks to the victim, other children, school or college staff
- contextual safeguarding issues
- Following a report of sexual violence, the designated safeguarding lead (or deputy) will make an immediate risk and needs assessment, considering:
- the victim
- the alleged perpetrator
- all other children (and if appropriate adult students and staff).
- Risk assessments will be recorded and kept under review as a minimum termly.

<u>Domestic abuse</u> is any incident or pattern of incidents of controlling, coercive, threatening behaviour, violence or abuse between those aged 16 and over who are, or have been, intimate partners or family members regardless of gender or sexuality. The abuse can encompass, but is not limited to:

- Psychological
- Physical
- Sexual
- Financial
- Emotional

Exposure to domestic abuse and / or violence can have a serious, long lasting emotional and psychological impact on children. In some cases, a child may blame themselves for the abuse or may have had to leave the family home as a result.

- ALL staff and volunteers understand what domestic abuse is and the potential impact upon children and how this might be displayed.
 The DSLs will: -
- Ensure that the school has suitably trained Key Adult/s in order to fulfil its obligations under Operation Encompass
- Ensure that the school's commitment to Operation Encompass is known throughout the school community via the means of staff training, parental letters, posters and the school website
- School should provide an overview of Operation Encompass with the names of the Op Encompass leads and a link to the Op Encompass website https://www.operationencompass.org/)
- Operation Encompass Leads are Mrs Gail Reader and Miss Lynne Turner

<u>Children Missing from Education</u> can be a potential sign of abuse or neglect including sexual exploitation, undergoing female genital mutilation, forced marriage or travelling to conflict zones.

- ALL staff and volunteers follow school procedures when a child misses education particularly on repeat occasions to help identify the risk of abuse and neglect
- The school <u>Attendance Policy</u> is up to date, reviewed annually and includes reference to CME
- There is an admissions policy and an attendance register

- The Local Authority is informed of any pupil who fails to attend school regularly, or has been absent without the schools permission for a continuous period of 10 school days or more
- where reasonably possible schools and colleges should hold more than one emergency contact number for their pupils and students.
- ALL staff will be aware that children going missing from education can be a warning sign of safeguarding considerations and act on these in line with the policy

Other vulnerable categories

ALL staff will have read Annex A of Keeping Children Safe in Education and be aware of specific forms of abuse and safeguarding issues and vulnerable groups of children including;

- Children in the Court system:
- Children with family members in prison
- Child Criminal Exploitation (County Lines)
- Homelessness

- when an issue is declared, advice will be sought from Ofsted about the need to apply for a waiver. If a waiver is necessary, a risk assessment will be carried out and proportionate measures put in place until a waiver has been issued or matters resolved otherwise <u>disqualification @ofsted.gov.uk</u>
- advice will be sought from Human Resources, LADO and/or Schools Safeguarding Officer if any staff are unclear about any aspects of Safer Recruitment
- Any staff concerns will activate a further DBS check

Management of Allegations

St Mary's Catholic High School understands that when an allegation is made against a member of staff and volunteers, set procedures must be followed. We therefore ensure that:

- ALL staff and volunteers are aware of the requirement to, and process of referring allegations against staff, including supply teachers to the headteacher
- ALL staff and volunteers are aware of the requirement to, and process of referring allegations against the headteacher to the nominated Governor
- The headteacher and/or Chair of Governors will discuss the allegation with the Local Authority Designated Officer (LADO)
- Headteacher will share allegations of supply teachers with the supply agency with the expectation of their full cooperation with both school and LADO during the investigation period

- School will inform new and existing supply staff and their agency of this school policy

All concerns of poor practice or possible child abuse by staff and volunteers should be reported to the headteacher. Vulnerable children include those who have a social worker (so all pupils on a CP or CIN plan) and those children that we as a school know and work with on a day to day basis, including all pupils on an EHCP. As a school we have extended the vulnerable pupil category to include all children who are open on a CAF assessment.

St Mary's Catholic High School Procedures during lockdown / self-isolation periods will be as follows:

- All external agencies have both the lead and deputy's school mobile phone number in case of any conference calls and all emergencies.
- All meetings CP, CIN and TAF's are to be attended via Teams/Zoom and in school where necessary.
- DSL and deputy work mobiles to be communicated to all families.
- Identification of key agencies to support all complex needs and these have been listed on the school website.
- Designated key workers to contact all vulnerable, critical and CAF children/young people daily as identified on the school's vulnerable register and to communicate all information to the DSL and Deputy so the register can be updated.
- CPOMS to be used as per all normal school safeguarding procedures.
- Four key staff to visit FSM children and families weekly (only during full lockdown)
- Pastoral Leaders to be issued with mobile phones to bridge contact and support with all families.
- DSL and Deputy to undertake safeguarding roles on a rota basis. (only in a full lockdown)
- All home visits to follow the Governments social distancing guidelines.
- To continue to work with South Ribble food banks to support families in need, during financial crisis and a full lockdown.

This has been left in for 2021/22 in case of a lockdown procedure again.
