### UKRAINE AND EUROPE:

As the week unfolded, we heard from one of our parishioners who was staying in Kyiv, Ukraine with her husband, their little girl and the child's Grandma. They left the city for their dacha in a small village, but could hear the Russian missiles flying overhead to bomb Kyiv. They drove west

for 400 miles, reached Bishop Hryhoriy in Drohobych, left their car there, and he got someone to drive them through the Carpathian mountains to the Slovak border, where they crossed safely. Over one million refugees have now crossed into Poland, Romania, Hungary and Slovakia.

**THANK YOU** to everyone who is contributing to the collection for the Ukrainian people. It raised £670 and remains open. We sent €1000 to Bishop Hryhoriy, and it arrived safely, so we will now send the balance of the collections. He says the Drohobych hospitals are full of wounded soldiers. They need supplies of medicines, dressings, pain relief and syringes, and also for the maternity departments. His diocese have opened all churches and available diocesan buildings to accommodate refugees. The seminary refectory is feeding 200 refugees daily. Seminary students are working with Caritas at the Polish border, loading humanitarian aid. Every donation is received with immense gratitude for your generosity. Thank you immensely for the anonymous donation of a £2,000. Please continue praying. Our prayers are being heard. Far more miracles are worked by prayer than we can ever be aware of in this world. We are not powerless. When we pray, we have God on our side. We beg Him to use His supreme power to disable the aggressors.

We pray that the ordinary Russian soldiers may realise they have been fed a load of lies by their commanders, that tanks will break down, missiles misfire, guns jam and the invasion stall. Please pray especially for the Patriarch in Kyiv Svyatoslav Shevchuk, sheltering in his cathedral crypt with 200 others.

When we watch the news and see the heart-breaking scenes from Ukraine we should think about two things. Firstly, we should pray for the suffering, dying and displaced people and bring some comfort to them through our prayers.

Secondly, we should take a good look around and really appreciate what we have. Our families, our homes, our beds, our food, our cars and most importantly our safety and freedom. The people of Ukraine are slowly having their homes, hospitals and cultural buildings bombed. We can see this happening via the media. At times like these we should appreciate what God has given us. Freedom of speech, freedom of elections, freedom of Faith and to come to church without fear.

### Jesus, I Trust in Thee. Have mercy on us and on the whole world.
