## LIVERPOOL ARCHDIOCESE STATISTICS 2022

In the Archdiocese of Liverpool: Baptised: 6,072. Receptions: 139. First Communions: 5,820. Confirmations: 1,191. Marriages: 342. Deaths 3,995. Mass attendees: 25,327

The good news is that there is an improvement of the Archdiocesan statistics from the previous year, which was badly affected by COVID. Going to church for a Sunday Mass is not '*old fashioned*' (as one parent called it). Coming to Mass and receiving the Sacraments is the backbone of what you are and how you will live your life (hopefully). If you live your life by following the 10 Commandments and teach your children to respect and love God, then you are doing the right thing. If perhaps you have 'slipped and gone AWOL' from the church, Lent is the ideal time to start afresh and **Repent and believe in the Gospel'.** 

**Our statistics are improving also;** Mass attendance is getting better, and Marriages and Confirmations have increased in number. Deaths remain about the same as in previous years and we have said goodbye to many people who had a lifelong commitment to St Mary's. First Holy Communions remain high in numbers, as in previous years.

The facts are clear. If you don't support your parish and priest and help or volunteer when you can, there will come a time when the pews will be empty, and the priest will be only a name or memory. Therefore, please support your church and parish as whole families and take part in the greatest gift that God has given to us – **Himself in the Eucharist.**

## BLESSED JOHN NUTTER AND GEORGE HAYDOCK, LANCASHIRE MARTYRS

**George Haydock** was born 1556, the youngest son of Evan Haydock of Cottam Hall, Lancashire, educated at the English Colleges at Douai and Rome, ordained priest at Soissons in 1581. Arrested in London soon after landing, he spent fifteen months in the strictest confinement in the Tower. This was relaxed to "free custody", so he was able to administer the Sacraments to his fellow-prisoners. He was forced to admit that he believed the Queen (Elizabeth I) was a heretic. On 5 February 1583 he was indicted with others for having "conspired against the queen at Reims", by planning to return to England as priests. He pleaded not guilty but was condemned.

John Nutter was born in Burnley. Like his older brother, Blessed Robert Nutter, he studied at St John's College in Cambridge. He entered the English College in Reims, and was ordained priest at Laon in 1582. He boarded ship for Yorkshire, but gales blew the boat onto sandbanks near Dunwich, Suffolk, beneath All Saints Church on the cliffs above. Locals looting the boat found a bundle of Catholic books. Nutter was interrogated and admitted being a priest. He was taken to the Marshalsea prison, and brought to trial a year later and condemned.

Five priests, Haydock and Nutter, plus **James Fenn, Thomas Hemerford**, and **John Munden**, were hanged, drawn and quartered at Tyburn, 12 February, 1584.
