PROGRAMME FOR LENT AT ST MARY'S


Ash Wednesday – Day of fasting and abstinence. Fasting applies to people aged from 18 – 59 years old. This involves eating one full meal and two smaller meals. The total food consumed in the two smaller meals should not be equal to a full meal.

Abstinence from meat on Ash Wednesday and every Friday applies to everybody

from age 14 upwards. People in poor health may be exempted from Fasting and Abstinence for medical reasons. Ash Wednesday Mass at 09.00 and 12.00 noon with distribution of Ashes. Fridays - 11.30am; Stations of the Cross. First Friday – Litany of the Sacred Heart after Mass.

Sundays 15.00 - Holy Hour and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament followed by Benediction.

Confessions – Saturdays 16.15 – 16.45 Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Tuesdays and Fridays 12.30-13.00.



Prayers to the Five Precious Wounds of Jesus – found on the table in the narthex. Decade of the Rosary (to be said daily in your own time) for world peace.

THOUGHTS FOR THE BEGINNING OF LENT

"Lent reminds us, therefore, that Christian life is a never-ending combat in which the "weapons" of prayer, fasting and penance are used. Fighting against evil, against every form of selfishness and hate, and dying to oneself to live in God is the ascetic journey that every disciple of Jesus is called to make with humility and patience, with generosity and perseverance." (Pope Benedict XVI)

"Lent and Ash Wednesday is not just about putting away the bad things. It is about creating good things and helping the poor and the needy" (Jacob Winters)

"Repent and believe in the Gospel". This invitation, which we find at the beginning of Jesus' preaching, introduces us into the Lenten season, a time to be dedicated in a special way to conversion and renewal, to prayer, to fasting and to works of charity. In recalling the experience of the chosen people, we too set out as it were to retrace the journey that Israel made across the desert to the Promised Land. We too will reach our goal; after these weeks of penance, we will experience the joy of Easter. Our eyes, purified by prayer and penance, will be able to behold with greater clarity the face of the living God, to whom man makes his own pilgrimage on the paths of earthly life."

"Your Father who sees in secret will reward you" (Mt 6: 4, 6, 18). Jesus' words are addressed to each one of us at the beginning of our Lenten journey. We begin it with the imposition of ashes, an austere penitential gesture very dear to Christian tradition. It emphasizes the awareness of sinners as they stand before the majesty and holiness of God. At the same time, it demonstrates readiness to accept and to transform into concrete choices adherence to the Gospel." (St John Paul II)
