HEALTH AND SAFETY UPDATE:

Inside this church, masks must be worn (unless exempt) hands gelled, keep 2 metres physical distancing. We want to continue to keep everyone safe. Against World Health Organisation advice, the government removed the legal obligation to wear masks in shops and on public transport etc on Thursday 27th. This puts especially the elderly and those with health problems more at risk. It looks to be a political rather than a medical or scientific decision. There are still 16,000 patients in hospital with COVID. The NHS is at full stretch and contending with the toughest winter on record.

The new infections in Chorley numbered about 1251 in the seven days up to Jan 22nd, down 9.2% on the previous seven days. So, it isn't dropping so quickly. Omicron is still dangerous and extremely infectious. Please continue to be very careful.

Baptisms are postponed until the pandemic subsides. Several are delayed because family members have contracted Covid. Thank you. Holy Mass will be kept short to minimize infection. ST JOHN BOSCO, founder of the Salesians, was born 1815 near Genoa. He was two when his father died, leaving his mother Margherita to raise.him and his two older brothers. He helped his family grow food and raise sheep. Despite their poverty, his mother still helped the homeless who came to the door seeking food, shelter or clothing. John attended church devoutly. Aged nine, he had a vivid dream in which he encountered a multitude of boys who cursed as they played. Among these boys, appeared a great, majestic Man and

Woman. The Man told him that in meekness and charity, he would "conquer these your friends." Then the Lady said, "Be strong, humble and robust. When the time comes, you will understand everything." This dream influenced John for the rest of his life.

He became enthralled by the magic tricks and acrobatics of circus performers. He studied their tricks and learned how to perform some himself for his friends. He would stage such shows, and end by reciting the Sunday homily he had heard, and with prayers. However, he was uneducated. He found a priest willing to teach him and provide a few books. John's older brother angrily whipped him saying "he's a farmer like us!" Undeterred, and as soon as he could, John left home, aged 12, to look for work as a hired farm labourer. Working at a vineyard, he met Fr Joseph Cafasso, a priest who was willing to help him.

Aged 20, John entered the seminary and was ordained priest six years later in 1841. He was assigned to a parish in Torino (Turin), then in the throes of industrialization, with slums and widespread poverty. Fr. Bosco went to work with the children of the poor. He discovered that the prisons held many 12-18 year old boys in awful conditions, and desired to help other boys from ending up there. He went into the streets to meet the young where they worked and played. First, he performed his magic tricks to attract their attention, then shared with them his message for the day. He sought work for boys who needed it, and lodgings for others. By the 1860s, Fr. Bosco and his mother were responsible for lodging 800 boys.

Fr. Bosco also negotiated new rights for his apprentices, to prevent their being beaten or exploited for unrelated menial work. He urged likely candidates to consider the vocation to the priesthood and supported them. Saints however often meet opposition. Some parish priests accused Don Bosco of stealing boys from their parishes. The city Police Chief opposed his catechizing of boys in the streets, which he claimed was political subversion.

In 1859, Fr. Bosco established the Society of St. Francis de Sales. He organized 15 seminarians and one teenage boy into the group. Their purpose was to carry on his charitable work, helping boys with their faith formation and to stay out of trouble. The organization still exists today and continues worldwide to help especially children.

John Bosco died on January 31, 1888, and was canonized on Easter Sunday, 1934. He was given the title, "Father and Teacher of Youth." He is the patron saint of apprentices, editors and publishers, schoolchildren, magicians, and juvenile delinquents. Those of you who have connections with Thornleigh College in Bolton, or Salesians elsewhere will know the great work the Order does in education and for young people. In 2020 there were 9,847 Salesian priests and 4920 brothers running 1,855 parishes and countless schools.
