Dear parents/ carers,

I would also like to say a huge thank you to our team who have volunteered to come in to work over the Easter break to provide childcare for children of critical workers– thank you, it is very, very much appreciated.

Another very big 'thank you' to you and your children for engaging so well in the remote learning over the last couple of weeks and staying in touch on *SeeSaw* and *Class Dojo*. It has been amazing and inspiring to see what the children have been able to achieve. Well done children, parents, teaching assistants and teachers. It has been a magnificent effort.

In saying that, I am also aware that every household has a unique set of circumstances, in terms of how well learning can be supported at home. Please do not berate yourselves if you see on social media, or on Dojo, or SeeSaw that other parents' children are flying through the work.

All we ask, and all that can be expected of you, is that the children do the best they can in their own particular circumstances. The single most important thing at the moment, as the government reminds us, is that you all keep safe, protect yourselves and the NHS, and ultimately that lives are saved.

The Services mark the most important time of the Christian year when the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus are commemorated. The Archbishop says, 'This year our Holy Week devotions will have to be different as we rightly respect government restrictions. We cannot physically gather as a worshipping community, but livestreaming gives us the opportunity to join together spiritually in sincere prayer and devotion as we commemorate the passion, death and glorious resurrection of the Lord.'

Palm Sunday, 5 April	11.00 am	Mass
Holy Thursday, 9 April	7.00 pm	Mass of the Lord's Supper
Good Friday, 10 April	3.00 pm	Commemoration of the Lord's Passion
Holy Saturday, 11 April	8.00 pm	The Easter Vigil and First Mass of Easter
Easter Sunday, 12 April	11.00 am	Mass
