School Values



Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural Development

At St Mary's, our vision — "With Christ, we live, love, learn and grow" — is deeply aligned with the principles of Spiritual, Moral, Social and Cultural (SMSC) development. We believe that educating the whole child means nurturing not only academic success but also personal growth, character, and values.

Our commitment to supporting children on a journey of **learning and faith** ensures that SMSC development is woven into every aspect of school life.

- **Spiritual Development** is nurtured through our Catholic ethos, collective worship, and opportunities for reflection. Children are encouraged to explore their beliefs, develop a sense of awe and wonder about the world, and grow in their understanding of themselves and others. With Christ at the centre, we help children discover meaning and purpose in their lives.
- **Moral Development** is supported by our emphasis on Gospel values such as compassion, forgiveness, and justice. 
