







Year 3 Authors, Poets and Stories

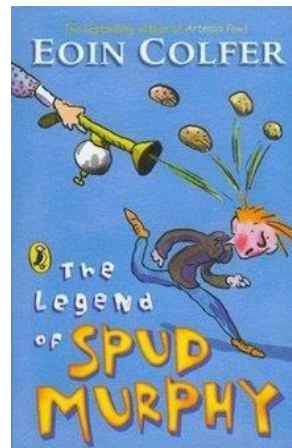
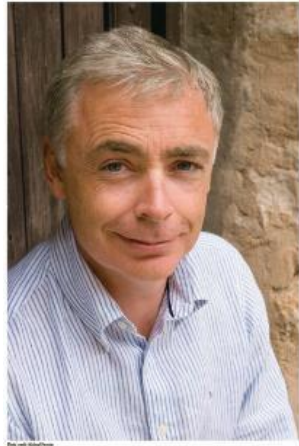

Ants, beetles, butterflies, moths and ladybirds are featured. Cafe Six is a highlight – a perfect impetus for teaching poetry in lower KS2 – if you can stomach the edible creepy crawlies. 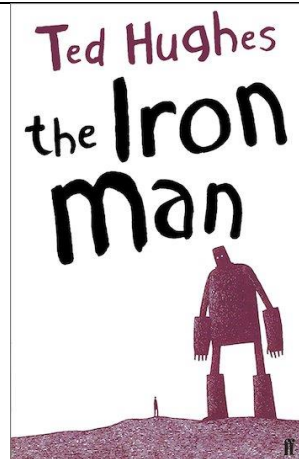
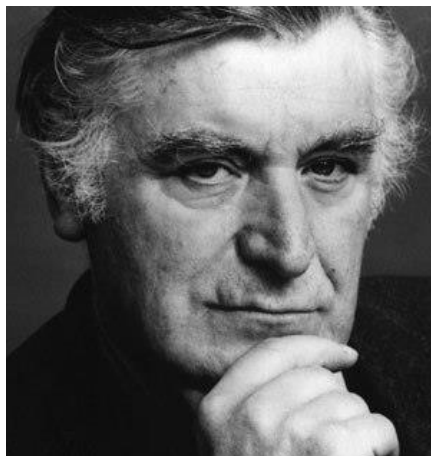


Eoin Colfer (born 14 May 1965) is an Irish author of [children's books](#). He worked as a primary school teacher before he became a full-time writer. He is best known for being the author of the [Artemis Fowl series](#). In September 2008, Colfer was commissioned to write the sixth instalment of the [Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy](#) series, titled *And Another Thing ...*, which was published in October 2009. He served as [Laureate na nÓg](#) (Ireland's Children's Laureate) between 2014 and 2016.

Ted Hughes (17 August 1930 - 28 October 1998) was an [English poet](#) and writer of children's stories.

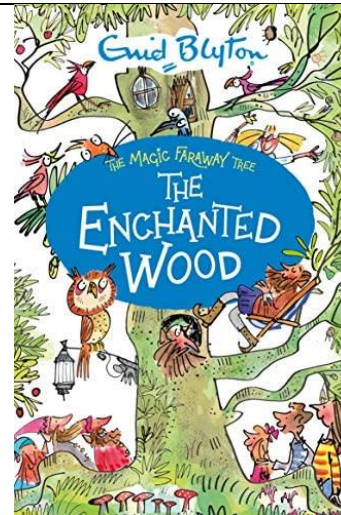
Hughes is considered one of the most significant and innovative [English](#) poets of recent times. His work is deeply reliant upon [myth](#) and the bardic tradition. He was born in Mytholmroyd, West Riding of [Yorkshire](#). Hughes studied English, anthropology and archaeology at Pembroke College, Cambridge.

Enid Blyton (11 August 1897 - 28 November 1968) was an [English author](#). She was born in [Dulwich](#), South London, [England](#). She was one of the [world's](#) most [famous children's writers](#). She is also one of the most prolific [authors](#) of all time. (This means that she wrote a great number of [books](#).) Her most famous stories are the Famous Five stories, about a group of four children (Dick, Julian, Anne, and Georgina, who wanted to be called George) and their [dog](#) (Timmy) who have many [adventures](#), and her Noddy books for small children.
