		Respectful relationships
		The importance of respecting others, even when they are very different from them, (for example, physically, in character, personality or backgrounds), or make different choices or have different preferences or beliefs. Practical

steps they can take in a range of different contexts to improve or support respectful relationships. The conventions of courtesy or manners. The importance of self-respect and how this links to their own happiness. That in schools and in wider society they can expect to be treated with respect by others, and in turn, they should show due respect to others, including those in positions of authority. About different types of bullying (including cyberbullying), the impact of bullying, responsibilities of bystanders (primarily reporting bullying to an adult) and how to get help. The importance of permission seeking and giving in relationships with friends, peers and adults.

Online relationships

The same principles apply to online relationships as to face-to-face relationships, including the importance of respect for others online. Sometimes people may behave differently online including by pretending to be someone they are not. How to critically consider their online friendships and sources of information, including awareness of the risks associated with people they have never met.

Being Safe

How to recognise and report feelings of being unsafe or feeling bad about any adult. How to ask for advice or help for themselves or others and to keep trying until heard. How to report concerns or abuse and, the vocabulary and confidence needed to do so, and where to get advice. What sorts of boundaries are appropriate in friendships with peers and others? How to respond to adults they may not know.
