

Absences

If your child is unwell, parents are requested to inform the school by 08:30 on *pupilabsence@stmaryscp.co.uk*. Absences of 5 days or more must be medically supported to be authorised. Please note that holidays in term time will not be authorised.

Absence below 90% is deemed to be 'persistent absenteeism' and schools have a duty to work with parents to secure improvement. Poor attendance may result in a penalty notice issued via the Education Welfare Service.

Assessment

Your child's learning and progress is assessed both formally and informally, throughout the year. Educational Visits

Educational visits are organised by class teachers to enhance and enrich children's experiences. A contribution is requested from parents towards the cost of trips; however, children will not be excluded where parents cannot afford to contribute.

Year 6 go on school journey in June. The visit is booked a year in advance and a non-refundable deposit is payable in March of Year 5. There is a payment schedule to split costs over the course of the year.

When a trip is planned, parents will receive an email informing you of the trip and requesting your contribution be paid via ParentPay. We will not ask you to return a consent form, as these trips are part of the curriculum. If the trip extends beyond the school day or is residential, we will seek your consent.

Equality and Diversity

St Mary's is committed to equality and diversity for all pupils irrespective of age, gender, race, creed or disability. We recognise that the effects of discrimination can limit potential and horizons. Those concerned with education at St Mary's recognise the importance of meeting the individual needs of children. They are encouraged to develop non-discriminatory attitudes and expectations about themselves, their role in the school and society in general.

At St Mary's it is our philosophy that a broad and balanced curriculum promotes equality and diversity, through the resources and topics used across different curriculum subjects. For example, within our English curriculum we promote multicultural texts which provide a diverse and culturally rich starting point for learning. Every book corner in every classroom includes a range of books, demonstrating equality and diversity in all forms; from characters, authors and illustrators. Through our carefully structured Art and Design curriculum, children encounter works by a range of global male and female artists, both traditional and contemporary.

As part of our wider inclusion and diversity learning children across the school learn about significant inspirational people from a wide range of ethnicities and abilities. As a school we also commemorate International Women's Day and the International Day for the Elimination of Racism. Our Relationships education programme and our learning of other faiths in RE support children in celebrating and valuing difference.

Black History Month

Like many schools, during the month of October we have a specific focus on Black History; however, we celebrate equality and diversity throughout the year and do not consider Black History to be confined to one month. As a school community we recognise people from African and Caribbean backgrounds have been a fundamental part of British history for centuries and that our society is richer for this.

We strive to ensure that we focus on local, national and international figures and events; for example, looking at the life of Dame Floella Benjamin of Beckenham and the contribution of the Windrush generation. The struggle of the Bristol Bus Boycott is part of our Year 2 history curriculum and is studied alongside the life of Rosa Parks. We welcome support from all our school community in ensuring that all are celebrated and valued irrespective of race, gender, ability or faith.

If homework is taking more than the recommended time or is becoming a battle with your child, please speak with your child's teacher.

Mobile devices

If your child walks to or from school unaccompanied by an adult, they may bring a mobile phone to school. All phones must be switched off and handed in at the office first thing in the morning and they can be collected at the end of the day. They should remain switched off until the child leaves school grounds. Teachers cannot keep pupils' phones in classrooms. If your child attends a club, the phone should be given to the club provider for safekeeping.

Smart watches are not allowed in school and if they must be brought in, they must be handed in at the office for safekeeping.

Reading Journals

In Reception and Key Stage One children are given a reading record book, which should be dated, filled in and signed by the adult who reads with them. Entries need to be kept for both sharing books and eBooks.

Central to the Little Wandle Systematic Synthetic Phonics scheme is building a life-long love of reading, therefore once children finish with Little Wandle Phonics in Year 2 (or above), they will continue their independent reading by choosing from a selection of books in their classes. They are given a reading journal to keep a record of everything they have read. Moving up through Key Stage Two, they are encouraged to choose more challenging books from classroom book corners, the school/local library, from home or even articles from magazines. Every child in KS2 should always have their reading material and journal in their bag, just they did in KS1.

Reading journals from yr. 3 upwards are exercise books with a selection of short tasks on the inside cover. Whilst they are reading their book or article or once they have finished it, the children self-select one of the tasks to complete (for example: design a new front cover; choose a new title for the book; explain the main theme; write a new blurb etc). As the year progresses, it is a lovely record of how much they have read and becomes a source of great pride.

Medical and Safety Considerations

It is important that we are made aware of any medical conditions, allergies or special dietary needs that a child may have. In cases where we are requested to administer prescription medication, written approval is sought from parents and the medication should be supplied in a container clearly labelled with the child's name.

Should a child have a minor accident at school, basic first aid will be provided by school staff.

Several pupils are allergic to nuts and nut products; therefore, these food products are not permitted.

PE

PE is a statutory subject, and all children are expected to participate, unless they are medically unfit to do so.

The funds raised are spent directly on enhancing provision for the children and recent projects include a trim trail for the Reception children to enjoy. The current Chair of the PTA is Mrs Donna Mentesh.

Religious Education and the Catholic Life of the School

Gospel values are intrinsic to every aspect of life at St Mary's and staff at all levels work with determination to ensure that the Catholic life and the character of the school is maintained.

The Religious Education curriculum is in accordance with the requirements of the Bishops' Conference; 10% of curriculum time is for religious education following 'The Way, The Truth and The Life' scheme. Additional work is undertaken linked to the liturgical year and there are opportunities for pupils to learn about other faiths.

Parents are warmly welcome to attend school Masses and religious celebrations, regardless of their own faith. This includes class Masses, whole school Masses, the annual carol service, and devotions in May, October, in Lent and Advent.

Doors open at 08:40 and children may come into classrooms from that time, ready for registration at 08:50. Punctuality and good attendance are essential to ensure that children make the most of the support and opportunities provided for them.

Entrances are as follows:

Reception: through Reception doors, adjacent to the Reception playground

Year 1: through Year 1 classroom doors

Year 2: through main entrance to the infant block

Years 3 and 5: through the rear door to the main building, adjacent to the KS1 playground

Years 4 and 6: through back doors of the classrooms

School concludes at 15:15 and children should be collected promptly. If a child is involved in an after-school club, all siblings must be collected at the normal time and remain under the supervision of an adult.

Safeguarding

School Meals and Snacks

Our school meal provider is Nourish. All meals are prepared freshly on site and our menus have been nutritionally analysed. Under the government's Universal Infant Free School Meal scheme, all children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 are entitled to free meals. Under the Mayor of London's scheme, all KS2 children are entitled to a free meal.

Free School Meals and Pupil Premium

Free school meals/pupil premium payments are available to all eligible pupils. <u>Please note that this is different to the Universal Infant Free School Meal and Mayor of London schemes.</u>

If your child qualifies for Pupil Premium, the school is allotted a sum of money which can be used to pay for clubs, educational visits, peripatetic music lessons and small group tuition.

These are the eligibility criteria. Parents of children aged four or over attending a maintained school who receive child benefit for the child/children and one or more of the following:

- Income Support (IS)
- Income Based Jobseekers Allowance (IBJSA)
- Income-related employment and support allowance (IRESA)
- Child Tax Credit, provided they are not entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual income, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs, that does not exceed £16,190
- Guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Where a parent is entitled to Working Tax Credit run-on (the payment someone receives for a further four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999.
- Universal Credit with an annual net earned income of no more than £7400 as assessed by earnings.

Visit your home local authority's website to apply.

At present, children qualifying for pupil premium also qualify for the Household Support Fund, supermarket vouchers to the value of £15 per week for school holidays.

School Uniform

Our supplier is Hewitts of Croydon, and they visit St Mary's once per term for direct sales.

The PTA sells pre-loved uniform regularly throughout the year. This is of good quality and parents are asked to make a monetary donation, rather than items being individually priced. Our uniform policy is appended.

Secondary Transfer

Our Year 6 children transferred to a wide range of schools both within and outside Bromley.

Open days for secondary schools take place in the autumn term and you will find details of these on individual school websites. We would encourage you to begin looking at schools in Year 4 as many have a narrow catchment area and you need to investigate which are a realistic option from your home address.

We do not prepare children for grammar school or independent school entrance examinations. We give our children a broad and balanced education and if you wish to pursue a selective route, the schools will signpost you towards suitable practice materials.
