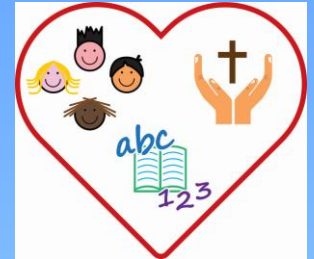


Welcome to Reception Induction 2019



Transition into School



- 4 stages to transition

1. Induction Pack sent to parents.
2. Parents Induction Meeting-due to COVID 19 via website and telephone.
3. Learning environment flipbook on website- Key information page

4. A phased induction will begin on Tuesday 1st September. We take 7 children each week. Once your child comes into school they are in full time. This is done in alphabetical order. We will be spending a slightly longer period settling the children before taking in new children. Please be patient with us as many children have not attended Nursery for such a long period and no time has been spent on visits before the summer break.



Uniform

- All children will be provided with a book bag on their first day. No need to buy one.

School Day



- 8:50am doors open. Collect at 3:15pm. Drop children off and collect at the pencils in the yard. If anyone different is collecting your child please inform school. They will only be allowed to leave with nominated people on the list.

- Lunch (11:45-12:55) - all children in Reception & KSI are eligible for a free school dinner/packed lunch.

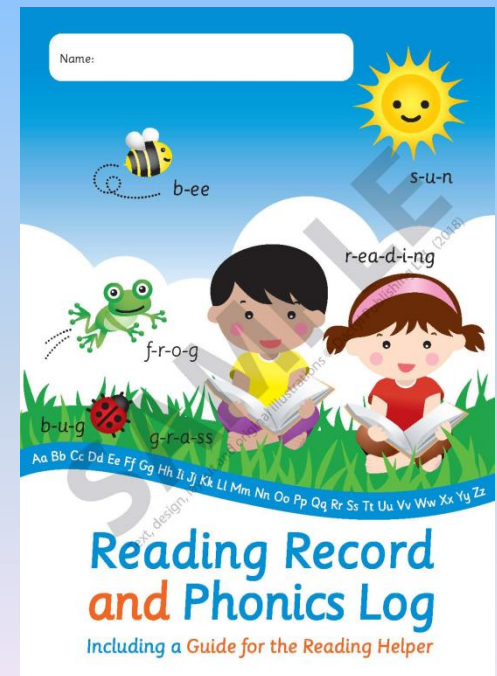
What can you do to help your child to read?



How often should we read together?

You should try to hear your child read everyday and write a comment in their reading record book.

Your child will develop much better reading skills if you hear them regularly at home.



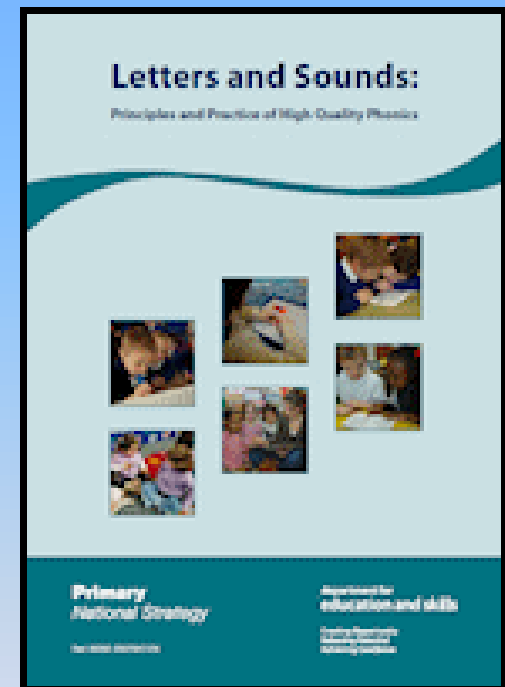
Why is it important to hear your child read?

- It helps them to apply their phonic skills and to enjoy stories
- It develops their imagination
- It develops their writing skills
- It supports your child become a better reader and writer

These are words which cannot be blended by sound-talking. These words have unusual phonemes.

For example:

- my
- they
- all
- said

Maths

By the end of the year children should be able to:

- Count to 20 orally & count out objects up to 20
- Say 1 more/less for numbers to 20
- Add & subtract numbers to 20 ($8+5=13$)
- Name 2D & 3D shapes
- Recognise coins
- Measure objects, and order by height and weight
- Begin to tell the time using o'clock
