

Pupil Premium Funding 2019-2020

St Nicholas Church of England Primary School is a Christ-centred, loving and nurturing learning-community. Uniting home, school and Parish, we strive to support, guide and develop the uniqueness of every individual's God-given gifts and talents.

At St Nicholas Church of England Primary School, we are inspired by Jesus to be the very best we can be. With his influence, we aim to create a calm, happy and purposeful environment for all children and staff. We will ensure all of our children achieve their full potential by developing their skills, talents and interests, within a creative environment.

We promise to provide a stimulating working environment and curriculum, which encourages learning in which children show interest, enthusiasm, and independence. We will facilitate children's achievements and potential by setting high standards and providing a carefully planned programme of work - delivered through high quality teaching.

The school receives funding to ensure we provide additional support to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils, this is called Pupil Premium. Every pupil who is eligible for Free School Meals, or who has been in receipt of Free School Meals in the past six years, receives £1320 for the academic year. The numbers on roll, and eligible for additional funding are determined at January census. The number of children who are eligible for funding may differ from the number of pupils who are on roll at the end of each Key stage and are included in assessment data. Pupils who are looked after receive £2300 and service pupils receive £300. All of these pupils are referred to as Ever6.

It is our role to ensure we allocate and spend this funding responsibly in order to have an impact on the progress of these pupils and close the gap between Pupil Premium children and others. Since September 2014, all pupils in KS1 have received Universal Free School Meals (UFSM), meaning all pupils aged 4 to 7 have a hot meal, every day in school. Those pupils in KS1, whose families are classed as disadvantaged, are in receipt of the Pupil Premium funding too.



<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Family Support Worker 100% of salary 	£15,142.28	<p>Attendance – Attendance has been securely above 96% for the past 3 years. JP works to support those families with attendance issues and works alongside the PWS to support / prosecute poor attendance where necessary. From 1/9/19 – 20/3/20 Attendance was 96%. Authorised absence was 2.3%. Persistent Absence was 10.5%.</p> <p>FIN – JP has worked with over 20 families this year. Signposting them to NHS / Children’s services; supporting families in financial hardship; conducting home visits; supporting families needing housing arrangements and being an ‘ear’ at school for anyone needing it.</p> <p>CIN / CP – JP has facilitated bespoke interventions for children on plans. She has worked with children on a 1:1 to develop self-esteem; self-confidence; helped children through times of loss and bereavement and worked with the DSL to support families.</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Lunchtime 2 x Play workers salary 	£7,231.77	<p>The 2 play workers have ensured vulnerable children have been supported through play at lunchtimes – they have worked with staff and the FSW to ensure all children are included in structured games and play.</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Teaching Assistants - salary 	£56,197.94	<p>Teaching Assistants have worked very well in key classes (EYFS, Y1, Y2, Y6) to ensure children have had interventions, support and additional teaching. In Y3,4 & 5, where one TA is working in the morning only, across both classes, the impact has been less evident. Teachers in these classes feel the TA cannot make a similar impact on PP children to those with a TA every morning – all morning. SLT to monitor the classes with the most PP children and allocate TA time accordingly.</p>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Intervention programmes e.g. Wave 3 / Springboard intervention time for TA's 	<p>£1088.01</p>	<p>Three teaching assistants were given additional hours to support small groups of PP children. These had a positive impact on standards in Year 4 with PP children at ARE rising from 18% to 60% in reading. PP pupils in Y6 made 8.2 steps progress (average is 6) in Maths and 8.3 in Reading.</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> 1:1 support for GRT PP children from Lancashire 	<p>£1000</p>	<p>From a baseline of no reading, writing or maths skills, both children have made accelerated progress and are now developing early maths / literacy skills. They are also being supported at home.</p>
