
### Listen Up!

Listen to this colourful piece of music from Korea called

#### **Tiger Dance**

It was composed by **Moon Pyung Hwang** for the 1988 Olympic Games in Seoul, Korea.

The music has got a very strong beat and rhythm. Can you tap your foot in time with the beat?

The instruments playing in this piece are: **Hyangp'iri** - a double-reed wind instrument, **Taegum** – a bamboo flute, **Haegum** – a two-stringed fiddle, **Drums, Cymbals, Gong**.

The music gradually builds up. Listen for four occasions when the drums dramatically stop then start playing again. In each of the four gaps a solo player *improvises*.

## **Explore**

We use **BEATS** to measure musical time. Beats are grouped together to make a repeating pattern, usually in twos, threes or fours.

Two beats to a bar



Three beats to a bar



Four beats to a bar



Now listen to a Symphony Orchestra playing a piece called **Prelude.** A prelude is an introduction to a larger piece of music. This is the introduction to an **Opera** called Carmen. The music has a strong, steady beat throughout. Clap along to the beat. Can you keep it steady?

Listen again. Now clap the beat in the ways shown on the left where the beats are grouped into different beat patterns.

Strongly accent the first beat of each bar with a loud clap, shown by this symbol which is called and ACCENT:

**Key Words:** 

Improvise: To make something up on the spot without any

preparation

Accent: an emphasis, stress or stronger attack on a note
