

Time for Music: 1 – Years 3 & 4



Listen Up!

Watch the Connect It film

It was written by a composer called **Anna Meredith**. She likes to write music that uses clapping, stamping, beatboxing and other body percussion sounds. She also uses electronic sounds. Connect It uses different rhythms, sometimes the performers play the same sound at the same time, sometimes they play a musical follow my leader so that the rhythms are staggered over each other (canon). Anna Meredith also works with choreographers to add movement to the performance.

Key word - Canon

This is where two or more instruments, voices or sounds play the same music, starting at different times

How about this for hand swirls?










Or what about the Snake Wave?
