Sports Premium 2022-2023, Evidencing Impact and Accountability

Primary PE and Sport Funding

In June 2022, The Department for Education announced that schools around the country would once again be allocated the Primary P.E. and Sports Premium funding, to improve the quantity, quality and breadth of P.E. and sport provision within school. This ring-fenced allocation is calculated according to the intake of the school and the school provision, encouraging increased participation in P.E. and Sport so that all pupils develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

At St Peters in 2022/2023 we used the funding to:

- Employ specialist teachers or qualified coaches to work alongside teachers in lessons to increase their subject knowledge and confidence in PE.
- Provide a variety of sporting opportunities for every child.
- Buy into local Sports Associations for competitions, tournaments and CPD support.
- Maintain links with P.E. teachers in Bay Leadership Academy to help teachers improve their P.E. and the sports provision in school.
- Support the Year 1 day trip to Borwick Hall for outdoor adventurous activities.
- Offer themed sports weeks/ days where children were able to experience and enjoy a variety of activities.
- Improve lunchtime activity provision investing in equipment to ensure playtimes are more active.
- Purchase new equipment in line with our P.E. improvement plan.
