Hannah is passionate about writing stories which share her love of the planet and when not writing, she's busy looking for her next big animal story and practising her roar.


Dear everyone at St Teresa's



Darwin's Dragons by Lindsey Galvin


Aimed at 9-12 year olds



Shipwrecked on a Galapagos island, he makes a discovery that could change the world - and make his fortune. But should he share his find, or will it lead to the extinction of a legendary species?

A Shelter for Sadness by Anne Booth Aimed at 5+

A small boy creates a shelter for his sadness, a safe space where Sadness is welcome, where it can curl up small, or be as big as it can be, where it can be noisy or quiet, or anything in between. The boy can visit the shelter whenever he needs to, every day, sometimes every hour, and the two of them will cry and talk or just sit, saying nothing.

And the boy knows that one day Sadness may come out of the shelter, and together they will look out at the world, and see how beautiful it is.





<u>When Stars are Scattered by Omar Mohamed</u> Aimed at 8+

Omar and his brother Hassan, two Somali boys, have spent a long time in the Dadaab refugee camp. Separated from their mother, they are looked after by a friendly stranger. Life in the camp isn't always easy. The hunger is constant . . . but there's football to look forward to, and now there's a chance Omar will get to go to school . . .

With a heart-wrenching fairy-tale ending, this incredible true story is brought to life by Victoria's stunning illustrations. This book perfectly depicts life in a refugee camp for 8-12 year olds.

Maya (Reception) said, "It was good because it was fun. I learned about Ruby and Joe who lived in a vardo."






Adam recommends!
