Please find the results of the recent questionnaire on Catholic life at St Teresa's. 26 questionnaires were returned to school. Thank you to the parents and carers who returned these forms. The responses were unanimously positive. As a school, we will act on the constructive comments made. Some parents indicated that they did not know an answer to a particular question so hopefully the information below explains this.

Our Mission statement is central to our school life and accompanied the original letter which was sent out with this questionnaire. As part of their Collective Worship, on a weekly basis, children discuss how they can continue to carry out the school's Mission Statement and how it is relevant to their lives. There is a class book in which they record their thoughts and actions concerning this. Our social justice commitment is strong. Through the RE curriculum children learn all about the Universal Church and the work of CAFOD and the Mini Vinnies, led by Mrs Sutton, work tirelessly to ensure that the vulnerable and needy are supported through fund raising initiatives throughout the year.

Our links with the Parish are strong – we celebrate class masses and whole school masses, with all parishioners. For the last few years, the children have also helped out at the Parish Fayre. Football competitions organised within the Summer Fayre programme have also meant that the Parish Fayre attendance has risen and families enjoyed picnics together on the field whilst watching the football matches. We prepare the children for receiving the Sacraments of Reconciliation and the Sacrament of the Eucharist. Parishioners and families are also welcome to coffee mornings after school masses.

Our wider links include our commitment to supporting charities locally, nationally and globally such as: carol singing to raise money for St. Teresa's Hospice; collecting foodstuffs and toiletries for Darlington Foodbanks; raising money for CAFOD projects abroad following work completed by our local CAFOD representative; raising funds for the British Legion; supporting the Macmillan Cancer Support Charity; raising money for the Guide Dog association following a talk given by a local guide dog owner; and much more!

We have also have links with local schools through the transition programmes for our year six pupils across the town and through our links with Carmel Education Trust. In order to keep our children safe, we have links with local police community officers, fire officers and the school nurse team who are invited into school to talk to the children at various points of the year. Year six also take part in a safety carousel with other local schools. In recent years, our older children have accessed events organised by the NSPCC and Show Racism the Red Card. Children link up with neighbouring schools when we attend The Good Shepherd mass when we support St. Cuthbert's Care. The older children also attend diocesan events such as special Faith event masses and Youth Mission events. Our sporting links throughout Darlington are strong. We have school teams and groups of children compete regularly in town events. As ever, we always aim to further widen our links so that the children have a wide range of useful learning experiences throughout their time at St. Teresa's School.

Thank you once again for completing the questionnaire on Catholic Life, your comments are very much appreciated by the staff and governors of St. Teresa's.
