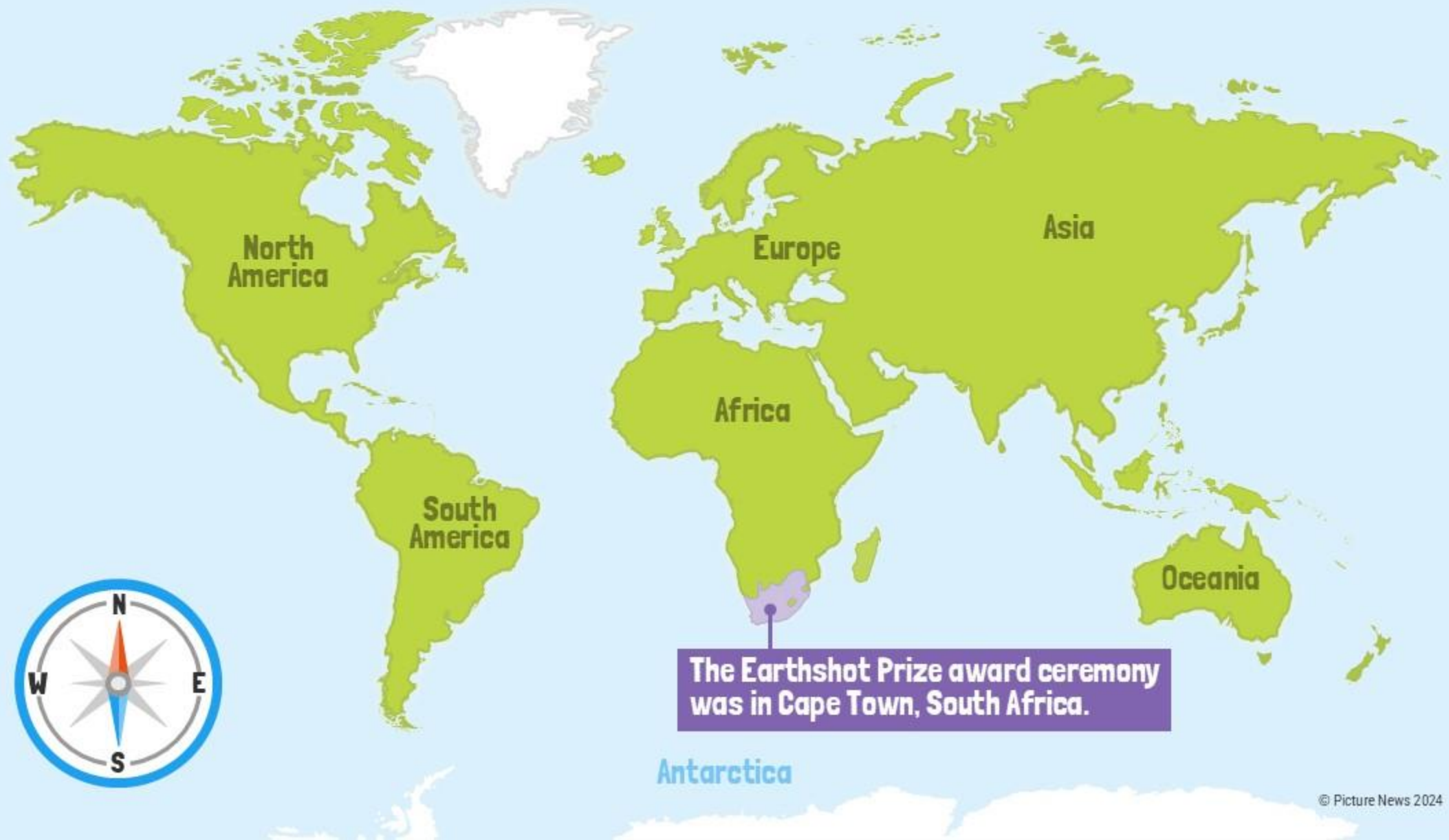

What is the Earthshot Prize?

The Earthshot Prize is an annual event, created in 2020 by Prince William and British wildlife presenter and historian, David Attenborough.

Each year, five winners receive £1 million to scale up projects designed to fight different environmental issues, from air quality to protecting the oceans.

On its website, the Earthshot Prize says it intends to find and grow the solutions that will repair our planet, 'We face our greatest challenge – to regenerate the place we all call home in the next ten years.'

A network of nominators search the globe for the latest innovations and creative problem solvers, whose work and ideas support the Earthshots.

I believe our world can be rich in possibility, in hope, and in optimism.

That is why the Earthshot Prize exists. To champion the game-changers, the inventors, the makers, the creatives, the leaders.

What are the five Earthshot goals?

The project is based on five Earthshots – 'simple but ambitious and universal goals for 2030 developed in collaboration with leading environmental experts'. They are:

Protect and restore nature

What kinds of animals, trees, or flowers do you see near where you live? Why do you think it's important to protect plants and animals? How could we help nature to grow and stay healthy?



Clean our air

How do you feel when you're outside in nature, breathing in fresh air? What makes the air feel fresh or not so fresh? What do you think could make our air cleaner?

Fix our climate

Have you noticed how the weather changes from season to season? What might happen if the Earth gets too warm? How would that change things for animals, plants, and people? What are some ways we could help keep the Earth healthy and not too warm?



Revive our oceans

What kinds of things live in the ocean? Have you ever seen rubbish on the beach or in the sea? How do you think it affects the animals? What could we do to help keep the oceans clean and safe?



Build a waste-free world

What happens to things like plastic bottles or food scraps when we throw them away? How could we reuse or recycle things, instead of throwing them out? What's one thing we could do to help reduce waste every day?

Protect and Restore Nature

Winner - Altyn Dala Conservation Initiative, Kazakhstan

Its mission is to protect and restore Kazakhstan's Golden Steppe, an area of grasslands and wetlands the size of France. This initiative has saved the critically endangered saiga antelope from extinction.

Fix Our Climate

Winner - Advanced Thermovoltaic Systems (ATS), USA

ATS has developed a technology that transforms waste heat from industries, such as cement and steel production, and converts it into electricity. This technology has the potential to save gigatonnes of CO₂.

(A gigatonne is a unit of weight equivalent to 1 billion tonnes.)

Revive Our Oceans

Winner - The High Ambition Coalition (HAC) for Nature and People, Global

The HAC is a group of 119 countries with the goal of protecting 30% of land and oceans by 2030. Currently, only 17% of the world's land and 8% of its oceans are protected. The HAC connects governments, provides them with technical and financial support, and holds them accountable.

Build a Waste-Free World

Winner - Keep IT Cool (KIC), Kenya

KIC helps small farmers and fishers by providing sustainable refrigeration systems. The cold storage units are solar-powered and have significantly reduced spoilage and waste. KIC has plans to grow into East Africa and beyond so they can support more communities.



Clean Our Air

Winner - Green Africa Youth Organization (GAYO), Ghana

GAYO's 'Zero Waste Model' is designed to help people make changes so that waste can be managed across Africa. In 2023, GAYO kept 170 tonnes of waste out of landfills.

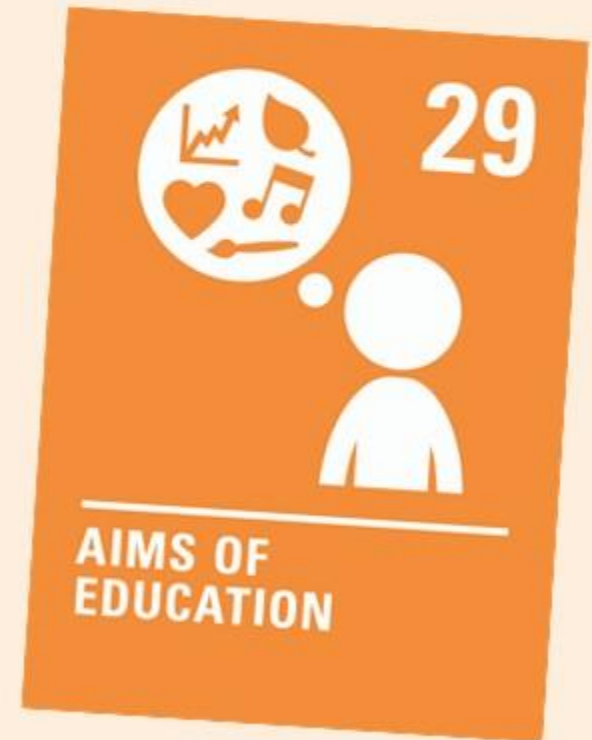

Pupil involvement

KS1 focus

How can young people become involved in Generation Earthshot?



- Look at the poster and talk about what you can see. What do you remember about this week's news story?
- Discuss the Earthshot Prize. Remind children that it's an award given to people who are coming up with ideas to help repair and protect our planet.
- Why do you think it's important to protect the planet? Whose responsibility is it? Can one person do it alone?
- This year, young people around the world are encouraged to join in through a project called 'Generation Earthshot'.
- Look at resource 1, which helps you to explore the five Earthshot goals. Spend some time thinking about and discussing each one. Which is the most important to you? Why? Do you feel like you can make a difference?
- Can you think of any ways people can help the Earth? For example, recycling, planting trees, or reducing waste.
- Did you know that even small actions, like turning off the lights when you leave a room or picking up litter, can help a lot!
- Can you think of any other little actions that can add up to big changes?

Reflection

Each small action we take to protect the Earth adds up. Together, we can make a big difference for our planet.

KS2 focus

Who are some of this year's Earthshot Prize winners?



- Share anything you already know about the Earthshot Prize. What are its aims? Are you aware of any winners from last year's competition? Do you know any of this year's winners?
- Look at resource 2, which shares some information about the five Earthshot Prize winners. Do you think these environmental solutions repair the planet? Discuss how impactful, inspiring and inclusive they are.
- Focus on the image of the saiga antelope. Have you come across this species of antelope before? Do you know anything about it? Were you aware that it had been on the brink of extinction? Whose responsibility is it to ensure it does not become extinct?
- Think about the word 'sustainable'. If an environmental solution is sustainable, it causes or is made in a way that causes little or no damage to the environment. This means it can continue for a long time. Which of the Earthshot Prize winners do you believe offer a sustainable solution?
- 'Urgency + Optimism = Action' forms part of the Earthshot Prize vision and mission. Discuss what you think this stands for. How important is action? Can you share any actions you take to repair the planet? Are they sustainable?

Reflection

The winners of the Earthshot Prize have already taken action to provide environmental solutions to repair the planet. We can all choose to take action too.



KS2 follow-up ideas

Option 1

Plan an event in school to celebrate children and families in your community that contribute to protecting the planet. Think about:

- Will you have categories e.g., Restore Local Wildlife, Clean Air, Waste Free?
- Will your categories have logos?
- What questions will you include on your application form?
- What evidence will you ask them to submit?
- What prizes will the winners receive?
- When will you open and close the competition?
- Will you hold a ceremony to celebrate them?

By learning about and sharing the contributions others are making in your local community, you can help to raise awareness and inspire others to take action!

Option 2

Use resource 2 and a world map.

- Locate where each of the Earthshot Prize winners are.
- The High Ambition Coalition (HAC) for Nature and People is global. What does this mean?
- The HAC has the goal of protecting 30% of land and oceans by 2030. Can you name and locate any of the world's oceans?
- Keep IT Cool (KIC) has plans to grow into East Africa and beyond. Can you find out which countries are East African?



KS1 follow-up ideas

Option 1

Let's make a 'Helping Hands for Earth' display! Start by drawing or painting the Earth on a large piece of paper. Draw or trace your hand and write one way you'll help the planet on it. This could be recycling, saving water or planting flowers.

Stick everyone's hands around the Earth picture to show how, together, small actions can add up to make a big difference!



Option 2

Invite the children to think about and bring in an item they think represents helping the planet. This could be a reusable water bottle, a piece of recycling, a photo of a tree they've planted, or a drawing of them saving water or energy. As a class, talk about each item and what they represent.

You could display them on a table or worktop in the classroom to create your very own 'Earthshot Actions' exhibition. Invite others in school to come and enjoy the exhibition, and learn about how they can do their bit to take care of our planet.

Whale Rescue!

A humpback whale, that became tangled in fishing ropes, has been set free in Loch Fyne, Scotland. The poor whale had ropes wrapped around its body and head, making it hard for it to swim. A team from British Divers Marine Life Rescue (BDMLR) rushed to help. Using underwater cameras, they saw how tightly the ropes were caught around the whale. 'It was a tricky job, but we're thrilled to see the whale swim away safely,' said BDMLR rescuer Sarah Collins. The team carefully untangled the

Bells Ring Out!

Notre Dame Cathedral, in Île de la Cité, Paris, is due to reopen on 8th December. It has been restored following a fire that destroyed a lot of the historic building in 2019. Earlier this month, people were overjoyed to hear the bells ringing out across the city for the first time in five years! Chimes from the cathedral's northern belfry were heard by thousands. The eight bells rang as part of a technical test. Three of the bells are new (pictured right), including the recently-gifted 2024 Olympic and Paralympic Games bell. This special bell rang out during the Games



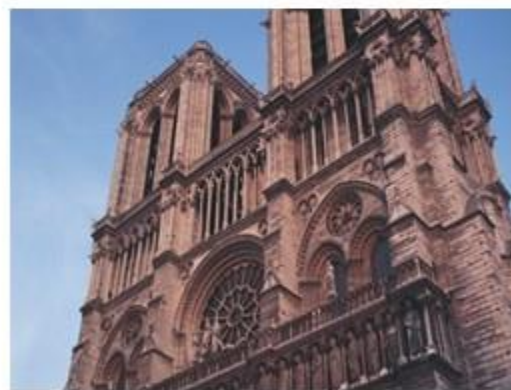
