Dear Parents and Carers,

Advent is a time for celebration and this week we had particular cause for celebration following the receipt of our Catholic Inspection report and achieving further awards for our work in Science and for our dedication to Children's Rights.

As you will be aware, on the 23rd and 24th November 2023 an inspection was undertaken at St Ursula's by the Catholic Schools Inspectorate. The purpose of this inspections was to report on the quality of the Catholic life and mission of the school, religious education and collective worship.

During the 2 day inspection, 4 inspectors observed learning and acts of worship in each class, talked to staff, pupils and parents, analysed school data, and discussed emerging issues with the school leadership team. The inspection culminated in a written report which stated:

A massive congratulations to our pupils for being "powerful ambassadors" and to Miss Gilligan (RE Lead) and our staff for once again demonstrating their commitment to our school community.

On Monday it was confirmed that St Ursula's had achieved a Science award, the <u>PSQM Outreach award</u>. Congratulations to our Science lead, Mrs Claydon. This is testament to the fantastic science work that happens at our school.

At St Ursula's we truly understand the importance of science in the primary curriculum and our vision is to make science accessible to all. As part of our outreach award we reached out and supported other schools locally and in neighbouring boroughs. We assisted them in the delivery of their science curriculum to make it more inclusive, impactful and (most importantly) enjoyable.

There are 3 available awards: PSQM, PSQM GILT & PSQM Outreach. We very proud to say that, out of hundreds of schools in this round of awards, we were one of a few that achieved the Outreach award. Again, congratulations to Mrs Claydon and all of our teachers and pupils.

On Wednesday our UNICEF Rights Respecting assessor informed us that we had been awarded the prestigious <u>Silver Rights Respecting Schools Award</u> from UNICEF. We are thrilled to become one of the first schools in Havering to be awarded this Silver award. This is an amazing achievement, recognising our continued journey after having gained the Bronze award a few years ago.

This award acknowledges not only all the fantastic work that our students do, such as volunteering to support others, raising money for charity, and celebrating key events such as Cultural Diversity week and Mental Health Awareness Week, amongst others, but also the knowledge they have gained about their rights. It is commendation of the fact that St Ursula's puts children's rights at the heart of our school and has built a community of mutual respect, inspiration, and diversity.

Thank you to Mrs Whittet (Rights Respecting Lead) who has led the school on this Rights Respecting journey, and a thank you to all the pupils, parents, and staff who have supported us along the way. We look forward to working with you all as we progress onto Gold Award.
