#### Stubbers:

#### English:

Our text for Spring 1 is 'The 1000 Year Old Boy' by Ross Welford. Our English text for Spring 2 is 'I was there: 1066 The Norman Conquest' by Jim Eldridge.

The 1000 year old boy is a wonderful adventure text that allows the children to make direct comparisons between Viking Britain and modern Britain through the eyes of the main character Alfie Monk who has lived for over 1000 years linking closely to the year 4 CLC topic: Who was tougher: Vikings or Anglo-Saxons? The book explores the themes of Growing up, passing of time, family, friendship, loss, history and love, allowing children to explore many real life issues whilst also being presented from different views.

Although this is fictional, the 'I was there in 1066: The Norman Conquest' account of the events leading up to and including the Battle of Hastings, interpretively attempts to re-create the sense of fear, uncertainty and doubt that modern readers believe must have existed in the consciousness of the warriors nearly a thousand years ago. This text allows the children to be fully immersed in the events of 1066 and to explore how they themselves can create descriptive pieces that transport readers to another time.

#### <u>Maths:</u>

For maths, we are continuing to follow the Power Maths scheme, where we will be covering:

*Multiplication and division	*Length and perimeter
*Fractions	*Decimal numbers

#### **Spring Science topics:**

This term, our science topics are Sound (Spring 1) and Electricity (Spring 2).

#### <u>CLC topics covered this Spring Term:</u>

Who were tougher: the Anglo-Saxons or the Vikings? (Spring 1)

How did the Normans change England? (Spring 2)

Our two creative curriculum topics for spring are designed to cover Geography, History, Art, D&T and Music whilst also drawing on children's maths, science and literacy skills.
