Communication

We are always available to speak to by phone or in person. You may receive letters in your child's book bag to inform you of any events in school. We also have a text service to send messages to parents which we use regularly. Therefore please ensure we have up to date mobile numbers. Within First Steps we also use an app called Class Dojo, when your child starts our setting you will be given a code to enter into the app, this allows you to see activities that your child and us as a setting have been doing. This is a closed group and can only be seen if you have been given an access code. We often use this service to communicate with parents, with a private message system available.

Opening Times

Nursery age children:

Morning session: 8.50am – 11.50am Afternoon session: 12.20pm – 3.20pm Beginning of week 15 hours: Monday 8.50am-3.20pm Tuesday 8.50am-3.20pm Wednesday 8.50am-11.50am End of week 15 hours: Wednesday 12.20pm-3.20pm Thursday 8.50am – 3.20pm Friday 8.50am – 3.20pm 30 hours provision: 8.50am – 3.20pm



Rolling Drop off: - all parents can drop children off at First Steps any time between 8.50am and 9.00am. From 9am, children arriving late should go to the main school office to be signed in.

Please ensure that children arrive to the sessions promptly as late arrivals interrupt our working day and unsettle the other children. Children arriving late regularly may be investigated by the Education Welfare Officer Department.

Rolling Pick up: Children can be collected from First Steps between 3.20pm – 3.30pm.

<u>Uniform</u>

Children attending First Steps are expected to wear the stated uniform:

- School sweatshirt / cardigan
- White polo t-shirt
- Black Joggers/Leggings
- Sensible shoes with Velcro fastenings

We do not allow the girls to wear skirts/dresses within nursery and reception, this uniform has been chosen after careful consideration for comfort and practicality.

Warm Weather Uniform

- Black sport / cycling shorts / leggings
- White polo shirt
- School cardigan / sweatshirt

Please mark ALL clothing with your child's name.

Jewellery

Please follow school policy regarding jewellery. It is not allowed to be worn during the school day. Please ensure all earrings are taken out as plasters are not allowed to be worn over earrings. Following new guidance if your child comes to school wearing earring and cannot take them out themselves, you will be called to come to school to remove them. If you would like to have your child's ears pierced we advise to have them done at the beginning of the 6 week summer holiday. This allows the time for your child to remove the safely when returning to school in September.

Library

Library is open Mondays and Thursdays. To join the library parents can purchase a school book bag from staff in the school office, which can later be used in school as their reading folder. Children put their folder in the tray as they come in, staff will then help them to select a new book to take home. Reception children follow the Sounds Write phonics scheme and will be given a reading book that matches the learning that has been taking place in class. Reception children should read their reading book from the scheme to adults each night and parents are asked to write a comment in the reading record book.

<u>IIIness</u>

If your child is ill please ring and let us know. If we do not hear from you as to why your child is not at First Steps we will send a message to you to ask the reason or the school office will ring. Children who are off school without a reason provided to school will be given an unauthorised absence mark and be monitored for further absence.

Please note St. Wilfrid's RC Primary have a No – smoking policy. We also ask that pets are not brought onto the premises.

A Day in the Life

Children often learn more effectively if they choose their own activities. We organise our environment into working areas, each promoting development of specific skills. We do monitor the choices being made to ensure that your child will have a varied experience and, if necessary, will guide him / her to where s/he needs to go. Adult led activities are ongoing in



each session and are planned around themes and children's interests.

Each day your child can choose from the following activities:

- Painting
- Sand / Water
- Malleable / play dough
- Mark making
- Cutting
- Fine motor
- Small / large construction



- Reading corner
- Maths
- Role Play
- Small world
- ICT
- Outdoors





<u>Snack</u>

Snack is available to the children during a whole class snack session. There is a snack table in school where

children can go and access water and milk at any time during the day. Children in First Steps do not need to bring a water bottle to school/nursery.

30 hours provision for Nursery age children

We currently offer 30 hours provision for nursery age children of working families. These children attend Nursery for the full day, Monday to Friday during term time. These children are required to bring a packed lunch for lunch. The children remain in the Nursery setting and are supervised by staff from the unit so that they are familiar with the adults. Nursery children who still require a nap will be given the opportunity to have a nap after lunch. Free School Meals and Pupil Premium Primary

Our school receives funding from the Government to cover the costs of providing education. This includes all school running costs, such as employing teachers and support staff, books and equipment, school building expenses and free school meals.

The school also receives additional funding known as pupil premium for pupils whose families receive certain benefits. All KS1 children (Reception, year 1 and year 2) currently receive a free meal via the Universal Infant Free School Meal scheme. We can only claim the pupil premium if we are aware of parents receiving one of the eligible benefits. Even if your child is on a packed lunch the school will still be able to claim the premium if you are eligible.

It is in **all** our interests that we bring in as much money as we can to support our school and ensure all of our children get the best possible education. To help your child and your school, we can do a very quick eligibility check for this additional



funding via Durham County Council. Forms will be given out in your welcome pack, please complete and sign as appropriate.

Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS)

Your child is starting the Foundation Stage of their education, which at St. Wilfrid's runs from age 3 and continues until the end of the Reception year. The Curriculum for pupils in the Early Years Foundation Stage (Nursery and Reception) is based on the Statutory Framework for the Early Years Foundation Stage 2021. Alongside this we use the new Development Matters and Birth to 5 documents to support learning and development.

The children flow freely through the foundation unit, where they can independently access a variety of different activities covering the seven areas of learning identified in the statutory framework.

At St. Wilfrid's Primary School we offer a curriculum rich in wonder and memorable experiences. We work hard to provide a stimulating environment that provides exciting opportunities, promoted challenge, exploration, adventure and a real love of learning. It is our **intent** that all children develop physically, verbally, cognitively and emotionally in an environment which values all cultures, communities and people. We aim for our children to be confident and independent and believe in themselves and interact positively with others. We understand that play is an integral part of learning and this is the heart of our early year's curriculum. We believe that the correct mix of adult directed and uninterrupted child-initiated play ensures the best outcomes for pupils.

Warm and positive relationships between staff and children, consistent routines and strong relationships with parents are key. We recognise the crucial role that early education has to play in providing firm foundations upon which the rest of the child's education is successfully based.

There are 7 Areas of learning:

- Personal, social, emotional development
- Physical Development
- Communication and Language
- Literacy
- Mathematics
- Understanding the World
- Expressive Arts and Design



The Foundation Stage will be both formal and informal. We assess the children by their stage of development not age so that every child can fulfil his / her potential. This is done through observations and daily activities. These assessments inform the child's next steps.

Religious Education

As a Catholic school Religious Education is an integral part of our curriculum. The children learn prayers and say them daily and are taught to make the sign of the cross. We hope to provide opportunities for the children to learn and develop skills, attitudes and understanding in preparation not only for continuing education but for Catholic Christian life.

Special Educational Needs

First Steps welcomes all children as individuals. Children reach different stages of developments at different times. Early identification of special need is important to ensure the child receives an appropriate education. We may seek advice from professional agencies (Speech and language service, health, Social Services etc.) to ensure the child receives all the help and support they need.

How you can help at home

1. Talk to your children...as much as possible, about anything at all. The more they are involved in conversation, the more and the quicker they learn.

 Listen to them...Hear what they have to say. It is important to them and, if they feel it is important to you, it will build their confidence and self-esteem.

3. Provide experiences...sand-play, water-play (bath-time), shopping, tidying-up, setting the table, etc...

- 4. Read to them... books, comics, cereal boxes, signs, anything... once ready, listen to your child read each night
- 5. Sing songs and rhymes together.
- 6. Provide a variety of materials...scissors, paper, glue,
- 7. Encourage independence.
