


During their time with us, pupils took part in two exciting taster lessons. In Science, they stepped into the world of physics, working to design and build their own marshmallow catapults.

## MOBILE PHONE REMINDER

### Why Time Without Phones Matters

It is important for pupils to spend part of their day free from mobile phone distractions.

Being without a phone helps pupils:

- Stay focused and ready to learn in lessons
- Build stronger friendships, through face-to-face conversations
- Reduce stress, as constant notifications can be overwhelming
- Be present in school life and engage more fully with activities and classmates

A phone-free environment supports better wellbeing and creates a calmer, more respectful atmosphere for everyone in our school.

We would like to remind all pupils that mobile phones must not be seen or used anywhere inside the school building. This includes corridors, classrooms, social spaces, and during lesson changeovers.

Phones should be switched off and kept securely in bags from the moment pupils enter the building until they leave at the end of the day.

Any pupil who has their phone out in school will have it confiscated. Confiscated phones will be kept safely in the school office and returned at the end of the school day.

I'd like to thank all of our pupils for their patience and good spirits during this week's very wet weather. I know it hasn't been ideal being indoors for breaks and lunchtimes, but you've handled it brilliantly and shown real maturity.

Hopefully the rain eases off soon so you can all enjoy getting back outside, taking part in activities, and making the most of our outdoor spaces once again.

I also want to extend a special well done to our Year 11 and Year 13 pupils, who have been sitting their Prelim Exams throughout the week.
