# UNIFORM EXPECTATIONS

At St Wilfrid's our school uniform is a key part of our identity and visibly demonstrates our commitment to being part of our school community. A high standard of personal appearance is expected, and all pupils are expected to wear their uniform correctly and with pride.

If a child arrives at school in non-uniform clothing, they may be sent home to get changed or be placed in isolation until a parent/carer brings the correct uniform. If a child comes to school wearing non-regulation items, such as a hoodie or wearing jewellery, these may be confiscated.

To ensure that our uniform is as affordable as possible, the large majority of items can be purchased from any uniform supplier including supermarkets and department stores. Blazer badges are provided by school to all new starters [issued on transition days] or are available to purchase via the Arbor app. School ties can be purchased from main reception or during parent's welcome evening, in cash. Replacement ties can also be purchased using the Arbor app.

In addition, South Tyneside Council works in partnership with Churches Together South Shields, the Key Project, and the Salvation Army during the summer holidays to collect, recycle, and distribute school uniforms to families in need.



# UNIFORM EXPECTATIONS

## St. Wilfrid's RC College Uniform - Years 7-11

- Black blazer with St Wilfrid's badge added
- Grey pleated knee-length skirt OR grey school trousers
- White shirt buttoned to neck
- Grey traditional woollen V-neck jumper [optional item, no other jumper / sweatshirt is allowed]
- School tie, green with gold diagonal stripes
- Plain black tights or white/black socks
- Plain sensible black shoes [Boots or trainers are not permitted]
- A sensible outdoor coat [plain, dark colours, no logos], this must be a formal coat, not a sweatshirt or tracksuit, no leather or denim. Coats should not be worn inside the building.
- Earrings / jewellery are not allowed
- Make up / fake tan is not allowed
- Fashion accessories, coloured nails, nail or eyelash extensions are not allowed
- Extreme haircuts or unnatural colours are not allowed



# UNIFORM EXPECTATIONS

## PE Kit

The PE uniform is as follows:

- Plain White polo shirt [no logo]
- Black games shorts
- Black sports/football socks
- Black ¼ zip PE sweatshirt [optional]
- Black tracksuit bottoms or school PE pant/leggings with logo [optional]
- Trainers

Pupils will complete a range of sporting activities throughout their time at St Wilfrid's RC College. Within several of these activities it is recommended that pupils have safety equipment including shin pads for football and mouth guards for rugby. Football boots are also recommended for any activity taking part on our school field in wet conditions. We would encourage the use of these items within lessons.



# EQUIPMENT EXPECTATIONS

## Equipment List

It is essential that every pupil is provided with an appropriate bag for carrying exercise and textbooks to and from school. This ensures that books and equipment are kept in good condition.

All pupils must provide their own equipment which must include:

- Black pen
- Green pen
- Pencil
- Rubber
- Ruler
- Scientific calculator
- A reading book

Pupils will be issued with a homework diary that they must bring to school each day. Families are asked to sign this weekly. It is also recommended that pupils bring a filled bottle of water with them. Only water is allowed to be consumed in lessons. Energy drinks are not allowed in school and will be confiscated.

# ATTENDANCE

Good school attendance habits are best started early. Children learn from those around them and you as parents/carers set the standards and expectations for your child. Showing your child, the importance of attending school every day not only helps your child to settle quickly when starting school but helps them to keep and maintain friendships and enjoy the school environment. At St. Wilfrid's RC College, our minimal acceptable attendance is 97%.

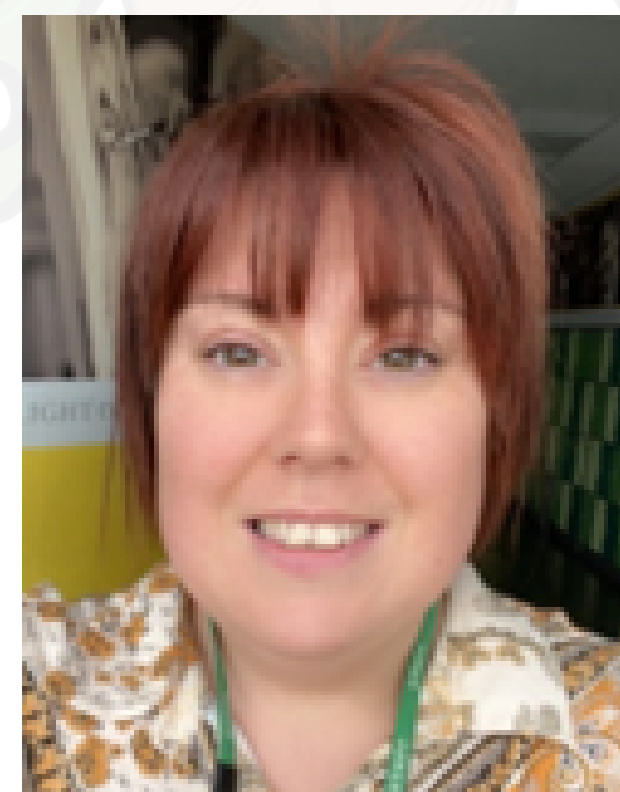
Be organised, have a plan, be consistent and involve your child.

You should:

- Create good routines for mornings at home so that your child can arrive punctually and they are properly equipped; this will also mean your mornings can start calmly too
- Make time to encourage and show interest. Chat to them about the things they have learnt, what friends they have made and even what they had for lunch! Remember children can be tired when coming out of school, so a short chat over a snack or later that evening may produce a better result than a long list of questions
- Read all school communications. A school planner can help with communication only when all parties use it as intended
- Attend school open evenings and functions
- Check your child understands the homework and that it has been completed. Support them in completing homework by creating a calm space for them to work in and set specific times during the week when homework should be done
- Share any education concerns your child or you may have with the appropriate member of school staff (Head of House or Assistant Head of House)
- Set realistic boundaries and sanctions
- Avoid absence from school wherever possible – try to make doctors and dental appointments out of school hours. Absence means your child will miss out on the academic studies and will also learn that education is not the main priority within the family. This can have a lifelong effect

# ATTENDANCE

Schools must take an attendance register twice a day, which is a legal document. Any absences will be recorded with a specific code depending on the type of absence. Absences fall into two main categories:

- Authorised – those which schools can give you permission for
- Unauthorised – those which they will not

Examples of absences which the school is unlikely to authorise can include:

- Sickness of a parent, or other family member
- Inadequate clothing for school
- Problems with transport
- Non-urgent medical treatment
- School refusal or truancy
- Days off for birthdays, shopping trips
- Family holiday

If your child needs a leave of absence you must ask for permission in advance. The headteacher can only approve the absence if he/she views them to be exceptional reasons.

As set down by the Department for Education, Penalty Notices can be issued for unauthorised absence.

Penalty Notices are issued when a pupil has had 10 or more half-day sessions (equivalent to five school days) of unauthorised absence, in the last 10 school week period.

Unauthorised absence is absence not approved by the school and will be coded on your child's attendance record.


Penalty notices are intended to provide an early intervention to deter patterns of unauthorised absence developing. Parents and pupils are supported both at school and at Local Authority level to overcome irregular attendance and any of the sanctions available are only for use when there is no parental co-operation or it is not sufficient to resolve the difficulties.

Shakespeare's tragedy illustrates the lengths the doomed lovers are willing to go to in order to oppose the prejudice and hatred between their families. Their marriage, and subsequent tragic deaths, symbolise the sacrifice they make in the name of love and peace. AO1

# TRANSITION

To support pupils ahead of their move to St Wilfrid's, we have developed a six-week Transition Programme designed to help them feel confident, informed, and well-prepared for the start of secondary school. Your child will be given weekly resources that include activities and bitesize instalments of information about life at St Wilfrid's.

This programme commences the week beginning Monday 18th May and will run until Transition Day on Thursday 9th July.

As part of our Transition Programme, key staff will be making visits to Primary Schools to get to know your child and to support them with the process of joining us in September.

During these two transition days our new pupils will be given the opportunity to:

- Experience a range of lessons across a variety of subjects
- Meet key members of staff
- Take part in a year group assembly
- Try a school lunch
- Have a guided tour of the building
- Begin to understand our routines and expectations
- Ask any questions that they may have
- Take part in a year group liturgy
