Vision and Overall Objectives

At St William's we promote and deliver music to all children regardless of background, ability or language. The music curriculum develops pupils' love of music, confidence and creativity, and provides children with a sense of pride and achievement through singing, playing, listening, evaluating and composing across a wide range of styles, periods, genres and traditions, resulting in the acquisition of knowledge. Children will listen, perform and compose in a safe environment where they can express themselves and take risks. They are given the opportunity to progress their creative excellence.

Our vision is to provide a rich, diverse, and progressive music curriculum for all children. (including during school hours and before/after school). This will be delivered through outstanding music teaching and leadership. Opportunities to learn musical instruments, and participate in ensembles in school, along with regular performances, both in and out of school will showcase our children and make our school a leader in music education within the local community and beyond. This will also maximise cultural capital for all our children, their overall wellbeing and confidence, while creating a supportive community of music making.
