Friday June 5th, Feast of St. Boniface

And this Friday is the Feast of St. Boniface. Boniface was born in England about 673, in Devon, actually. Apparently he was called Winifrid until Pope Gregory II gave him the name of Boniface (and I'm sure he was quite pleased about it). He travelled around Europe, and eventually became

known as the apostle of Germany. He was consecrated Bishop of Mainz by Pope Gregory during a visit to Rome in 722. He travelled throughout Germany where he established or restored dioceses, and set up monasteries, notably at Fulda, where he is buried. Although he became Bishop of Mainz, he did not give up his itinerant missionary life, continuing to travel and whilst trying to set up a new missionary enterprise in Holland he was killed by pagans in Friesland in 754.

Lord,
your martyr Boniface
spread the faith by his teaching
and witnessed to it with his blood.
By the help of his prayers
keep us loyal to our faith
and give us the courage to profess it in our lives.
Through Jesus Christ our Lord
who lives and reigns with you

Apparently, Devon County Council is trying to get him officially made Patron Saint of Devon. There is a Church dedicated to him in Crediton and they think he would be good for tourism!

I know some of you have written to our local MPs regarding the opening of Churches. I wrote to our MP here, our parishioner Paul Maynard and asked him if he would like to say something on this message, which he readily agreed to, and subsequently he agreed to this being sent to the diocese, though making it clear that he is speaking as our MP and parishioner and not for the Government as he is not a Minister. These are his words to us:

Like many, I yearn for the time when the doors of our parish churches can once again be flung open and our community reassembled. As much as I champion the argument that the church is the people, not the building, it is the solidarity we find in communal worship that reinforces the church's foundations.

But when will this be? June was speculated upon but we have seen no change – and I suspect it may be only for private rather than communal acts of worship initially when it does, with capacity reduced.

I have made the case to Ministers that a phased reopening starting with individual prayer needs to start sooner rather than later. It needs all faiths to make the argument, work with the Cabinet Office on guidelines for safe reopening as every other sector is doing. This is far more complicated than we might think and leads to some perverse outcomes – zoos suddenly appeared on a banned list

unexpectedly yesterday. But the Bishop's Conference is confident it has a plan that will work, and is engaging with government.

No-one wants to risk being the one responsible for a single extra infection and when we reassemble we will find that much will change in terms of practicalities – but if we can attend Norcross Open Market on a Sunday morning, the churches ought to be open too in my view.

Thanks to Paul for his words, and for his work and support in ensuring that we can open our doors soon.

Any more suggestions for how I can raise money for a statue of St. Bernadette for the school Memorial Peace Garden?
