

Sunday November 8th, Thirty-Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year II, Remembrance Sunday

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

A very different Remembrance Sunday than we are used to, but we will make the best of the day.

In a couple of weeks' time we celebrate the feast of Christ the King, the final Sunday of the Church's year. And as the liturgical years draws to a close, the readings in these last Sundays ask us to think about the last things, the end of the of time and the coming of Christ in his glory. And the familiar parable of the ten bridesmaids which is related to us in the Gospel today clearly asks us to think about the preparations we are making for the end of time, for the judgement of Christ, and for the Second Coming.

Heaven, the Kingdom of God, throughout the Scriptures is often compared to a wedding feast, a totally wondrous, joyful occasion. It's important to note that lest we worry about the end of time and some great horrible judgement, the wedding feast descriptions are there to show us that we should be looking forward to a joyful time, a time for rejoicing, with no sadness or bitterness or note of discord whatsoever. And any thoughts of Last Judgement can and should be seen as referring to our final entrance into eternal Life rather than the ultimate end. And that has to be something to be look forward to.

It's completely appropriate too, then, that the second coming of Christ at the end of time should be compared to the arrival of the Bridegroom at the wedding feast; one of the highlights and most important moments of the celebrations, and the focal point of great joy and rejoicing. And this parable focuses on the preparations that bridesmaids have been making. We are not asked to do much thinking in this parable; little is left to the imagine. Jesus immediately tells us that five were wise and five were foolish; five had taken spare oil for the lamps and five had not. Five had looked forward, prepared for the task which they had been assigned, and five had not. Five are responsible for their own actions, whilst five expect others to be able to supply what they lack. Five, have taken seriously the task in hand, prepared for it, and taken their role in this wedding feast seriously, are ready for the bridegroom and are admitted into the feast. Five, realising their mistakes too late, are themselves too late, and fail to make it in time for the festivities and the arrival of the bridegroom. Jesus doesn't dwell on any suggestions that the five wise bridesmaids should have handed over some of their oil. This parable is

not about selflessness or selfishness. It is about being single mind in one's desire to prepare for and fulfil one's duties and so enter the banquet - the wedding feast of the Lamb, in heaven.

Each of us, every single one of us, has a lifetime to prepare for heaven, to focus our minds on Christ, and await his return in glory. Jesus is open about the fact that we do not know the day or the hour, hence, as the Book of Wisdom says watch early and you will have no trouble. Living out the teachings of Jesus Christ is not something any of us can put off until tomorrow; it's far too important. Now is the hour of preparation.

And remember, we are preparing for something joyful, and so our preparations, our Christian lives, should also be joyful. It's not a question of being frightened of not going to heaven. It's a question of being determined to take up the invitation offered to us, spurred on by St. Paul's joyful assurance that where we hope to go, many of our friends and families have already gone before us. With such thoughts as these we should comfort one another. And with such thoughts as these we should continue, maybe just begin, our preparations.

Lord,

I do love You and I desire to love You all the more.

Help me to remain wide awake in my life of faith.

Help me to keep my eyes on You through all things

so that I am always prepared for You when You come to me.

Through the same Christ our Lord.

Amen.

So, let's joyfully continue our journey to heaven as we sing 'Immortal, Invisible, God Only Wise.'
