Give thanks that you have been called to life – and to new life in Jesus Christ.

Give thanks that you are indeed God's work of art.

In Luke 12:13-21 we have the parable of the man who stores all his crops in a huge barn and, never thinking of anyone but himself, decides to sit back and live the good life – but that night the Lord demands his soul, and who will have his riches then? 'So it is when a man stores up treasure for himself in place of making himself rich in the sight of God.'

O Lord, forgive me if I have not believed Your Word about storing up treasure in heaven.

Help me to trust in You and in Your Word more than I trust in this world.

Today I want to trust my future into Your hands.

Help me to trust You enough to invest my treasures in Your kingdom,

which is where I hope to spend all my future days.

Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

Since we are now experiencing Tier 3 Covid Lockdown Restrictions I thought it was time to write to our local MP and Parishioner Paul Maynard, to ask for some thoughts, as he has previously addressed us all through The Message. This is what he wrote to us:

Events over the past week filled me with a looming sense of dread as it became clear we would be placed in Tier 3 – despite our infection rate currently running below many areas still in Tier 2. Predicting the future, even by poking entrails with a stick or looking at the tea leaves, is a fool's game right now. Balancing the need to protect public health, whilst trying to maintain not just economic activity but family life and social engagement remains a balance that I, for one, am grateful I do not have to take a final decision on.

MPs and Councils across Blackpool, Fylde and Wyre had successfully argued up until now for a carve-out for the three authorities from the rest of Lancashire because of our lower infection rate. However, it became clear increasingly that central government were only prepared to treat us as a single unit. To a certain extent it is for 'ease' - the difference between Blackpool and Wyre for the week it existed was deeply confusing to many. All changes are causing confusion and frustration mind you, with patience certainly ebbing faster than the virus.

We now know far more about the virus too, how it spreads, who is most at risk and how it can be treated. Regulations need to be both proportionate in their impact compared to the risk to public health, but also targeted at areas of daily life where there is epidemiological evidence of risk. For example, Blackpool's infections are occurring almost exclusively in domestic settings where households are mixing, which is why it is in the places where we are perhaps the most relaxed that we need to take the greatest care.
