Following the dreadful news from Lancaster Cathedral at the weekend - which has finally been reported on the news - various prayer groups and friends are starting a nine day novena of the Holy Rosary of the day, as from 7pm this evening through to Tuesday evening of the 27th October for the protection of all our priests throughout the world, from attacks. It would be lovely if we could all join in, whether at 7pm or any other time.

Usually around this time of year the Bishop presides over the Education Mass at the Cathedral, with many people involved in all different parts of education in the diocese coming together: Priests, Teachers, Head Teachers, and people from the Education centre in Lancaster. Names of new teachers, or teachers in new roles, as well as retiring governors etc. are read out and prayed for. With the present restrictions the Mass could not take place this year, so instead a service was held over 'zoom' with over a hundred people watching and praying at their computers. So Thursday afternoon I sat with our headteacher Mrs. Satterthwaite in her office, and we joined in with the service. The Bishop told us 'Education is a key part of the Church's mission in sharing the good news of the Gospel with all people. It recognises that all human experience presents opportunities for developing and deepening our love and knowledge of God and of others.' And some beautiful prayers were prayed, concluding with words from Theresa of Avila.
