Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

Another day of rain ahead of us, so the advice to stay home seems doubly sensible!

The whole chapter of chapter seven of the Letter to the Hebrews refers to the vague figure of Melchizedek. He was a priest to whom Abraham gave obedience. There is no reference to his birth or death, so he is said to be forever. He was superior to the Levite priests, and in Hebrews 7:1-3,15-17. In a sense he foreshadowed the great high priest, Jesus Christ, who is forever.

Jesus again shows his power in Mark 3:1-6 when he cures a man with a withered hand. He asks the Pharisees 'Is it against the law on the sabbath day to do good, or to do evil, to save life of to kill?' but they refuse to answer him. His actions enrage them, and even though we are only at chapter three of the Gospel of St. Mark we are told 'The Pharisees went out and at once began to plot against him, discussing how to destroy him.' Let us pray for steadfastness in our faith:

Dear Jesus Christ,

please help me to remain steadfast in faith

so that I can be crowned in heaven.

Give me the grace to resist temptations,

and help me to live uprightly with you always.

Enable me to exercise genuine repentance

so that I can be fit for your kingdom.

Empower me through your Holy Spirit

to be diligent and keep your testimony until the end.

When the end comes, let me receive a warm welcome in heaven,

and let me partake in your holy banquette.

Amen.

We actually have a choice of Saints to celebrate today: Saint Fabian and Saint Sebastian. St. Fabian was elected to the role of Pope in the year 236, though he wasn't even a priest. He divided Rome in to seven distinct areas in order to help better serve the needs of the poor, and was finally martyred under

the Emperor Diocletian. St. Cyprian called him 'an incomparable man.' St. Sebastian was also Italian, born around the year 300 in Milan. According to tradition he was a guard in the Emperor Diocletian's Imperial army. After becoming a Christian he too suffered martyrdom, and his tomb, on the Via Appia in Rome, soon became a place of pilgrimage. He is often shown in art being impaled with arrows, and is patron Saint of Doctors and the Police.

Grant us, we pray, O Lord,

A spirit of fortitude,

So that, taught by the glorious example of Saints Fabian and Sebastian,

We may learn to obey you rather than men,

And make progress by communion in the faith

And by worthy service.

Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
