Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

In Hebrew 10:32-39 we are reminded that because we belong to Christ we have had our struggles, we have been involved in persecution. Keep up the struggle. We need to keep our hope before us, we need fortitude. 'Be what you were at your best... You and I are not the sort of people who draw back and are lost; we are the sort who keep faithful until our souls are saved.'

And in the Gospel, Mark 4:26-34 we have two lovely parables about the growth of the Kingdom of God. First we have the Parable of the Seed Growing Secretly, until the wheat crop grows and the farmer is ready to reap what he has soon, and secondly the Parable of the Mustard seed, which is the smallest seed of all, but grows to become the largest tree of all, with all the birds coming to nest in it. 'Using parables like these he spoke the word to them, as far as they were able to understand.' Let us pray that God's Kingdom will come, and that we can play our part in its growth:

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Almighty God,
your ascended Son has sent us into the world
to preach the good news of your kingdom:
inspire us with your Spirit
and fill our hearts with the fire of your love,
that all who hear your Word
may be drawn to you,
through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
