Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

So Thursday it is, and we continue with our lunchtime masses, where it is so lovely to see people. Many thanks to the sacristans, stewards, servers, cleaners, ministers and readers who keep the liturgies going as beautiful and as safely as possible.

In the old covenant we just expected a God of lonely majesty, a complete separateness from God, a prostrating fear. Think of Moses before the burning bush. Christians have something different - the new glories of heaven with the joyful assembly of the angels and God's people; we have God the judge, but also Jesus the perfect high priest. Hebrew 12:18-019,21-24 tells us that in Jesus 'we have the mediator who brings a new covenant and a blood for purification which pleads more insistently than Abel's.'

In Mark 6:7-13 Jesus sends his disciples out on their first mission - this was to be the first test of their faith and apostleship. Jesus gives the disciples instructions about how they should conduct themselves and what their lifestyle is to be, as well as giving them authority over the unclean spirits. 'So they set off to preach repentance; and they cast out many devils, and anointed many sick people with oil and cured them.' Help us to be the best missionaries we can be for Christ, preaching and living out the teaching of Christ, as a witness to his word:

Here I am, Lord, send me; to the ends of the earth; send me to the rough, the savage pagans of the wilderness; send me from all that is called comfort in earth, or earthly comfort: send me to death itself, if it be but in Thy service and to promote Thy kingdom. (St. Frances Xavier)

Dearest Lord, teach me to be generous; Teach me to serve thee as thou deservest; To give and not to count the cost, To fight and not to seek for rest, To labour and not to seek reward, Save that of knowing that I do thy will. (Ignatius of Loyola)

Lord, make me an instrument of Your peace. Where there is hatred, let me sow love, Where there is injury, pardon. And where there is doubt, faith. Where there is despair, hope. Where there is darkness, light. And where there is sadness, joy. (Saint Francis of Assisi).

And why don't we sing the Prayer of St. Francis, 'Make Me a Channel of Your Peace.'
