Sunday February 14th, The Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, Year B

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

I have my second day studying NLP so once again we gratefully welcome Father Tom who will be saying this morning's mass. I believe all went well yesterday evening.

When the first Lockdown started a lot of people were saying there were going to use the time to learn a new skill, and enthusiastically took up the guitar or juggling or whatever. In the second lockdown, which coincided with dark nights and bad weather, enthusiasm was somewhat lacking.

There's a lot of enthusiasm in this Sunday's Gospel. First of all there is the enthusiasm of Jesus. Last week he told us that his primary mission on this earth was to preach the Good news of the Kingdom of God, by word and action. The miracles are signs of his preaching, but many of the miracles are made to happen through the compassion of Jesus for the sick and the suffering, and in response to people's faith. Here it states that Jesus felt sorry for the leper, and almost can't help himself. In response to the lepers faith that he can cure him Jesus says '*Of course I want to; of course I want to cure you.*' And Eileen has once again helpfully provided us with a knitted version of the scene.

The response of the leper on being cured is equally enthusiastic. Jesus tells the cured leper not to tell anyone about the miracles. But the man can't help himself. He 'can't not' talk about his miraculous cure, freely and everywhere. Such is his enthusiasm for Jesus. But there is cost to this enthusiasm. It's recorded in the Scriptures how many people involved with miracles were branded liars by religious leaders, often the one's to whom they had to show themselves to prove their healing. There are certainly a number of such incidents in the Acts of the Apostles.

But the real cost in this Gospel is for Jesus. It's difficult for us to come to terms with just how outcast all sick people were in Jesus' time, but especially lepers. The first reading, Leviticus 13:1-2,44-46, is Old Testament pastoral theology at its most brutal. Jesus put himself greatly at risk by associating and worst of all, touching a leper in the first place. His association with the lepers would certainly have incurred the wrath of the religious leaders who were stuck with their pharasaical interpretation of the law. But in associating with this outsider, out of love and compassion, it also made Jesus, in a sense, an outsider too, as he found himself having to withdraw from open places in town, to go where he could carry on his main mission, his preaching, the reason, we heard last week, that he came to earth.

St. Paul really sums all this up for us. If your faith is important to you, when, as he says, whatever you eat, whatever you drink, whatever you do at all you will do it for the glory of God. Being enthusiastic towards the Church means working and preaching and praying, maybe when we are tired, when it's inconvenient, when there is something else that we could be doing. It means being prepared to follow the teachings of the Church, even those we find difficult or which fit in uncomfortably with our lifestyles. It means being prepared to learn and read and pray about the Scriptures and the teachings of the Church so that whatever we do at all we are doing it with an educated conscience. And it means finding out *how* we can serve God, especially in these strange Covid times It means putting Christ, and his teachings, and his Church, first in our lives, whatever the cost.

The Corinthians to whom St. Paul write did not have the New Testament so he said take me for your model. We do have the New Testament. So let us, enthusiastically, take Christ for our model.
