Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

Well, it's Ash Wednesday in a couple of days' time so we have just two extracts from Genesis to take us up to Lent. The first, Genesis 4:1-15, 25, tells the well-known story of Cain and Abel. It is an account of fratricide, brother against brother, of the conflict between the farmer and the stockgrazer, and the difference between the settler and the nomad. Because humankind was bound by evil, we have jealousy, and people killing each other, which was never meant to be.

In Mark 8:11-13 the Pharisees start a discussion with Jesus demanding a sign from heaven. 'With a sigh that came straight from the heart,' Jesus tells them that no sign will be given to this generation, firstly because they would not see and understand, and secondly because they had the person of Jesus, the Messiah in front of them, and don't recognise him, because they don't see him with the eyes of faith:

For the gift of faith
which sees beyond the present moment
and looks to an eternity,
we thank you.

For the gift of faith
small as a mustard seed, which has power
within its simplicity,
we thank you.

For the gift of faith
bestowed on those who would simply come to Jesus,
hearts open in humility,
we thank you.

Amen.
