Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

Another beautiful morning to wake up to. The good weather really helps our time in lockdown.

And we dip into the Book of Deuteronomy today. Deuteronomy 26:16-19 reminds us of the Law of Moses, '*The Lord you God today commands you to observe these laws and customs; you must keep and observe them with all your heart and with all your soul... and you will be a people consecrated to the Lord,* ' and He will be your God.

And for our Gospel today we dip into the Sermon on the Mount, Matthew 5:43-48. To be children of our Father in heaven, we must do more for others than the pagans do. 'Love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you.' It's hard for us to recognise how revolutionary this teaching of Jesus actually was – it was such statements that led to his death. When Jesus says 'You must therefore be perfect just as your heavenly Father is perfect,' he is lovingly showing the great potentiality he sees in us to be the best people we possibly can be – after all, we were all made in the image of God, and restored to that image at the moment of our baptism.

Loving Father,

thank You for the example of Jesus Who cried, Father forgive on the cross.
Help me to be one that freely and willingly prays forgiveness over those who are my enemies, and those who, for whatever reason, dislike or try to harm me.
Forgive my enemies Lord, and all those who have tried to hurt or harmed me.
Give me the grace to show them the love of Christ in my actions and attitudes towards them.
Give me the grace, not only to truly forgive all my enemies
but also to bless those who persecute me,
for in so doing I see a dim reflection of Your enormous grace towards me,
for which I praise and thank You.
Through Christ our Lord.

The children from St. Bernadette's are taking part in a video in which all the schools in Blackpool send in a little segment, with a prayer and a hymn, on a certain theme, but all based around the Stations of the Cross. We were given the theme 'forgiveness', appropriately enough given today's

Gospel. This is the prayer I wrote for them, a 'Children's stations of the Cross on the Theme of Forgiveness':

Pilate unfairly condemned Jesus to death. The soldiers made Jesus carry a heavy cross. The people made Jesus fall down the first time. Jesus met his blessed mother Mary. Simon of Cyrene helped Jesus carry his cross. Veronica wiped the blood off Jesus' face. Someone pushed Jesus down on to the ground. Some women of Jerusalem wept for Jesus.

People laughed at Jesus when he fell the third time. They harshly pulled the clothes off Jesus' back. They nailed Jesus to the cross. Jesus died on the cross.

They soldiers took Jesus down from the cross. They laid Jesus in a borrowed grave.

And Jesus forgave him. And Jesus forgave them. And Jesus forgave them. And Jesus loved her. And Jesus thanked him. And Jesus was grateful. And Jesus forgave them. And Jesus told them to weep for people who do not ask for forgiveness. And Jesus forgave them. And Jesus forgave them. And Jesus forgave them. And his last words were 'Father forgive them, they don't know what they are doing.' And Mary forgave them. And from heaven, God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit continues to forgive us.

God our Heavenly Father, on Good Friday Jesus showed us the true meaning of forgiveness, when he suffered and died for us, so that all our wrong choices could be washed away. Thank you for your forgiveness, and help us to forgive one another. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
