Friday March 5th, 2021, Friday in the Second Week of Lent

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

In the Scriptures today the character of Joseph, he of the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat, is compared with Jesus, being betrayed by their own people and servants. Genesis 37:3-4,12-13,17-28 tells us that Joseph, the favourite son of Jacob, was sold by his brothers because they were very jealous. But for Reuben, they would have killed him but instead. 'They sold Joseph to the Ishmaelites for twenty silver pieces, and these men took Joseph to Egypt.'

In the Gospel Jesus tells the parable of the unjust stewards, which is really an allegory of the History of Salvation. They went so far as to kill the owner's son, the heir. This prefigures Christ's death. Grace came through this death. Jesus quotes psalm 118: 'It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone. This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see.' With Christ let us pray that beautiful psalm:

Open to me the gates of righteousness,

that I may enter through them

and give thanks to the Lord.

This is the gate of the Lord;

the righteous shall enter through it.

I thank you that you have answered me

and have become my salvation.

The stone that the builders rejected

has become the chief cornerstone.

This is the Lord's doing;

it is marvellous in our eyes.

This is the day that the Lord has made;

let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Save us, we beseech you, O Lord!

O Lord, we beseech you, give us success!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord.*

We bless you from the house of the Lord.

The Lord is God,

and he has given us light.

Bind the festal procession with branches, up to the horns of the altar.
