Saturday March 27th, 2021, Saturday in the Fifth Week of Lent

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

Another beautiful day as we enter into holy Week with our first mass of Palm Sunday this evening.

For our last daily reading before Holy Week we head over to the prophet Ezekiel, where in Ezekiel 37:21-28 we have another reminder of the covenant that God made with his people. Salvation and peace will eventually come to them. '*And the nations will learn that I am the Lord, the sanctifier of Israel, when my sanctuary is with them for ever.*'

To take us down to Palm Sunday our Gospel today is John 11:45-56 with the High Priests are discussing what to do with Jesus. Caiaphas prophesies that one man must die for the people - through this act salvation and peace will come. *"It is better for one man to die for his people, than for the whole nation to be destroyed." From that day they were determined to kill him.* The Gospel ends on a cliff-hanger as Passover draws near, with people gathering in Jerusalem, asking *'What do you think? Will he come to the festival or not?* 

Father, we are in an unprecedented season for our generation,
but You are still the God of miracles.
We have heard of Your fame and renown,
as in Your deliverance of Your people at Passover.
Oh, Lord, renew Your miracles and wonders today,
through the healing of nations and individuals,
and the spreading of Your Good News worldwide.
