Tuesday March 30th, 2021, Tuesday in Holy Week

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

Today we talk about glorification. Once more we turn to the book of Isaiah, in which the coming Messiah is referred to as 'my servant in whom I shall be glorified... I will make you the light of the nations so that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth.' Isaiah 49:1-6 is filled with such hope – the hope that can see us through the crucifixion to the resurrection.

Thank You, Father,

that my eternal future is built upon Christ Jesus, my Lord and I pray that I may hold unswervingly to the hope I have in Him, knowing that He Who died on the cross to pay the price for my sins, and drew me with His cords of everlasting love into His family, is faithful to complete the good work that He started in my life, for His Word stands fast for ever and ever. Amen.

The words '*Night had fallen*' become a chilling metaphor in John 13:21-33.36-38 as Judas goes out into the darkness, to betray Our Lord. After he has gone Jesus gives a little sermon to the disciples about the hour of his glorification, '*Now has the Son of Man been glorified… You will look for me, and, as I told the Jews, where I am going you cannot come.*' When the disciples question him he answers, '*you will follow me later,*' perhaps referring to their own martyrdoms, their own glorification of God, years later, knowing that at this point they will all run away, and Peter deny him, despite Peter's protestations that he will follow him everywhere. Let us glorify God as we recite Psalm 96:

Sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth Sing to the Lord, bless his name; proclaim his salvation day after day. Tell his glory among the nations; among all peoples, his marvellous deeds. For great is the Lord and highly to be praised, to be feared above all gods. For the gods of the nations are idols, but the Lord made the heavens Splendour and power go before him; power and grandeur are in his holy place. Give to the Lord, you families of nations, give to the Lord glory and might; give to the Lord the glory due his name! Bring gifts and enter his courts; bow down to the Lord, splendid in holiness. Tremble before him, all the earth; declare among the nations: The Lord is king. The world will surely stand fast, never to be shaken. *He rules the peoples with fairness. Let the heavens be glad and the earth rejoice.* Let's 'Sing It In The Valleys, Shout It From The Mountain Tops.' O Mary, you always brighten our path as a sign of salvation and of hope. We entrust ourselves to you, Health of the Sick, who, at the Cross, took part in Jesus' pain while remaining steadfast in faith. O loving Mother, you know what we need, and we are confident you will provide for us as at Cana in Galilee. Intercede for us with your Son Jesus, the Divine Physician, for those who have fallen ill, for those who are vulnerable, and for those who have died. Intercede also for those charged with protecting the health and safety of others and for those who are tending to the sick and seeking a cure. Help us, O Mother of Divine Love, to conform to the will of the Father and to do as we are told by Jesus, who took upon himself our suffering sand carried our sorrows, so as to lead us, through the Cross, to the glory of the Resurrection. Amen.
