Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

Continued Easter Greetings. And after a wonderful (if somewhat exhausting) Easter Weekend, we now celebrate Easter Week – and every day is Easter Day, as we have a whole Octave to enjoy this beautiful Feast. And we have a whole fifty days of Eastertide to take us to the great Feast of Pentecost, the fiftieth day, on the 23rd of May - hopefully with more lifting of restrictions!

Throughout the whole of our fifty days of Eastertide we will be reading from the Acts of Apostles. It's rare that I suggest reading a book of the Bible from start to finish in one sitting as it were, but the Acts of the Apostles does benefit from this. It's like an adventure novel. When I was asked to do a video talk for Year 6 on the early Church, I described it as a bunch of shipwreck survivors landing on a desert island, having to cope with wild animals and marauders, whilst setting up a new community. You really understand the inspiration for those Biblical Blockbuster films. Today's extract, Acts 2:14.22-32, we have Peter's Pentecost morning sermon, where there is a brand new message: Christ was crucified but is risen. Even the great King David is still in his tomb, but 'Christ... is the one who was not abandoned to Hades, and whose body did not experience corruption. God raised Jesus to life, and all of us are witnesses to this.' Let us pray to be good and faithful witnesses:

Dear Lord, how we praise and thank You, and worship You for Your greatest of all gifts, in sending the Lord Jesus to be our Saviour and Friend and for dying in our place on the cross, to pay the price for our sins.

Thank You that when two or three are gathered together in Your name You are there in our midst. And thank You Father, for the many blessings that You shower over each one of us day by day. Give us grateful hearts and a willingness and desire to share with others the grace and mercy that You have showered on us day by day, without measure.

Help us Lord, to demonstrate Your great love and grace to all those that cross our paths today. May we be ready and willing to be faithful witnesses of You and to give an answer for what we believe, so that many may also come to know You and to accept Jesus as their own personal Saviour and friend, because they saw Him in us.

Help us to edify and uplift other members of Your body and in all things to be Your hands and feet, Your eyes and ears and Your heart of love in all we say and do today. In Jesus' name,

And our Gospels for this Easter week give us the various resurrection appearances from all four Gospels. Today in Matthew 28:8-15 we have the appearance of Jesus to the women, who are given the honour of being the first to preach the news of the resurrection to the Apostles.
