Sunday April 11th, 2021, The Second Sunday of Easter

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

Well, I have to say. I think Easter was wonderful. The services were beautiful. The singing was wonderful. The weather was tremendous. And almost two hundred people came here to celebrate together that Jesus rose from the dead, as well as a good number watching online.

That's a wonderful thing to be able to say, but it's wrong on at least three accounts. No, I don't mean that the whole of our Easter services were dreadful and that nobody turned up. No, what I'm questioning is the statement that Easter *was* wonderful. Because to say that Easter *was* wonderful, using the past tense, is wrong, wrong on three accounts.

Firstly, we are still within the octave of Easter, which means that this Sunday we are still celebrating Easter Day, and in the preface to the Eucharistic prayer this morning you will hear me refer to refer to the joy of this Easter day. So it is wrong to say Easter was wonderful: it is still Easter, and it is still wonderful.

Secondly, Easter doesn't last one day nor just the eight days of the Easter octave. We have fifty glorious days of Eastertide to take us right up to Pentecost, the fiftieth day, and our celebrations of the descent of the Holy Spirit, and beyond. Remember: Christ has died, Christ is, **is** risen.

Thirdly, to speak of Easter only in the past tense, does not take into account the teaching and encouragement of the risen Jesus. For the first words of the risen Jesus to the disciples which we hear in the Gospel from St. John today, do not speak of the past, but only of a wonderful present, and a great and glorious future.

If this Easter has meant, or rather is meaning anything to us, then it should fill us with the peace and the joy which the disciples experienced on that first Easter day. But we should also be filled with the spirit of mission, that all Jesus did for us will not remain in the past, nor be just remembered celebrations one day, eight days, or fifty days of the year, but will be present and active within us, today in the present, and for the whole of the glorious future promised to us by Jesus.

Good and gracious God, Our most glorious Creator, As we greet the signs in nature around us: Of Spring once again regaling us in bloom, In the songs of returning birds and fields soon to be planted, We give you praise for an even greater sign of new life: the resurrection of your Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ, that we especially celebrate in these fifty days of Eastertide. The sadness and despair of his death has given way to the bright promise of immortality. For the Resurrection is our guarantee that justice will triumph over treason, Light will overcome darkness, and love will conquer death. As we celebrate, we also dare to ask for your grace that we may live the promise given to us, By imitating the life of Jesus in reaching out to the poor, the marginalized, the least among us, As we strive to be neighbour to all those we meet, We praise you for this joyful Easter season. Change our lives, change our hearts to be messengers of Easter joy and hope. We make our prayer through Jesus Christ, our risen Lord forever. Amen.

Today's Gospel, John 20:19-31 as well as taking us onward to look forward to Pentecost, also recounts the story of 'doubting' Thomas, and his great profession of faith 'My Lord, and my God.' Eileen has helpfully provided us with a knitted version of the scene. When he does eventually see Jesus. Jesus tells him, 'You believe because you can seem me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.' And that means me and you, a great cause for happiness indeed.

Father,

Please help me to rest in your happiness, To allow a smile to linger on my lips, To dwell within a wonderful memory, To walk back through sunlit places. Please help me to sing with faith, To carry the truth close in my heart always, Please help me not to miss A single drop of heaven, To catch each moment And drink in the great happiness of a life of faith in you. Amen.
