Thursday April 15th, 2021, Thursday in the Second Week of Eastertide

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

And yet again the Apostles are dragged in front of the authorities, who are starting to look like the bumbling policemen in 'Pirates of Penzance'. 'You have filled Jerusalem with your teaching!' they cry in Acts 5:27-33. In a reply which many saints have used in the past two thousand years, and the words of St. Thomas More come to mind to me, Peter replies 'Obedience to God come before obedience to men.' When the Apostles are quite open that it was the chief priests and scribes who had Jesus put to death we are told, 'This so infuriated them they wanted to put them to death.' This is the prayer of St. Ignatius of Antioch on the privilege of martyrdom. Its rather good.

In your prayers, ask only this for me,

that the Lord may give me strength

that I may not only be called, but proved to be a Christian.

Then I will be seen faithful when the world no longer sees me,

for nothing that is seen is eternal.

The things perceived are temporal,

but the things not seen are eternal.

I write to the churches and charge you all

that I die willingly for Christ,

if you do not prevent me.

I ask that your love for me be at the right time.

Allow me to be devoured by wild beasts,

through whom I may rise to God.

I am the grain of God ground between the teeth of wild beasts,

that I may be found to be the pure bread of Christ.

Then indeed will I be the true disciple of Christ

when the world will no longer see my body.

Not as Peter and Paul do I command you.

They were apostles,

I am the least of them;

they were free,

but I am a slave even to this day,

but, if you wish,

I will be the freedman of Jesus Christ, and in him I will rise again and be free. Amen.

Today we head over to John the Baptist, who in John 3:31-36 is giving a sermon to his disciples, not unlike Jesus' sermon to Nicodemus yesterday, explaining why the Son of Man has come to earth. God gave his Son the Spirit and 'Anyone who believes in the Son has eternal life, but anyone who refuses to believe in the Son will never see life.'

faith in Your Word is the way to wisdom.

Help me to think about Your Divine Plan that I may grow in the truth

Open my eyes to Your deeds, my ears to the sound of Your call,

so that my every act may help me share in the life of Jesus.

Give me the grace to live the example of the love of Jesus,

Form in me the likeness of Your Son and deepen His Life within me.

Through Christ our Lord. Amen.
