'They landed at Salamis and proclaimed the word of God in the synagogues of the Jews.'

I have come not to Comden the world, but to save the world.' Jesus goes on to explain how his words come from the Father, 'therefore what the father has told me is what I speak.' News from Australia, where over the weekend they celebrated Anzac day. This is a national day of remembrance in Australia and New Zealand that commemorates all Australians and New Zealanders

'who served and died in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations' and 'the contribution and suffering of all those who have served'. Observed on 25 April each year, Anzac Day was originally devised to honour the members of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) who served in the Gallipoli Campaign, their first engagement in the First World War. These words by Kemal Attaturk, the founder of modern Turkey, from 1934, are inscribed on a monolith at Ari Burnu Cemetery (ANZAC Beach) which was unveiled in 1985. Coming from the country's leader the words did a lot of healing.

Those heroes that shed their blood

And lost their lives.

You are now lying in the soil of a friendly country.

Therefore rest in peace.

There is no difference between the Johnnies

And the Mehmets to us where they lie side by side

Here in this country of ours.

You, the mothers,
