Thursday April 29th, 2021, Thursday in the Fourth Week of Easter

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

It looks a beautiful morning, which I'm glad about as I'm in the cemetery this morning, which is chilly on the sunniest of days, but at least there's no rain. However, I am wearing my special 'cemetery boots' as you are never quite sure what the ground will be like!

We continue following Paul's great first missionary journey. First of all he went to Cyprus, before travelling to Pamphylia and Antioch, where, in Acts 13:13-25 he preaches his first great sermon, in the Synagogue on the Sabbath, pointing out the Jewish lineage of Jesus, the Messiah, 'God has raised up for Israel one of David's descendants, Jesus as Saviour, whose coming was heralded by John.'

Jesus, Name Above All Names' Beautiful Saviour Glorious Lord. Emmanuel, God Is With Us'. Blessed Redeemer Living Word.

In our Gospel readings for the rest of Eastertide we go the whole way through Jesus' Last Supper Discourse, to the Apostles given on Maundy Thursday. In many ways this is Jesus' last will and Testament, essentially his final words of teaching to the Apostles before his death. And, as recorded in the Gospel of St. John, they are very beautiful. In today's extract, John 13:16-20, directly after he has washed the feet of the disciples he tells them, '*I tell you most solemnly, whoever welcomes the one I send welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me,* ' words which would be very precious to the disciples on their various missionary journeys after the resurrection. And so as we pray that we can welcome God's message, God's messengers, God's Son, and God himself, let's pray this 'Welcome' prayer by Father Thomas Keating, reminding us to thank God for everything he sends us this day:

Welcome, welcome, welcome.
I welcome everything that comes to me today
because I know it's for my healing.
I welcome all thoughts, feelings, emotions, persons, situations, and conditions.
I let go of my desire for power and control.
I let go of my desire for affection, esteem,

approval and pleasure.

I let go of my desire for survival and security.

I let go of my desire to change any situation,

Condition, person or myself.

I open to the love and presence of God

And God's action within. Amen
