Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

Have you got your Vaccine Passport? As we are off to Greece now, with Paul travelling to the great city of Athens where he gives another great sermon. He gets the Athenians on his side by first of all praising them for 'how extremely scrupulous you are in all religious matters.' In Acts 17:15.22-18:1 he then tried to show the Athenians that their statue to the unknown god was really one to the true God, and 'we are all his children.' It is all going down very well, until Paul mentions that Jesus was sent to call people to repentance, 'and God has publicly proved this by raising this man from the dead.' At this many start laughing and scoffing at him, through there are a few who wish to speak with him again on the matter, and several of them become believers. It's good to know that even the great St. Paul's teaching wasn't always totally successful.

Heavenly Father,

Remind me when people close their eyes to good acts,

remind me when people close their eyes to heavenly preaching,

that all your chosen ministers have known rejection, disappointment and discouragement.

Strengthen us to understand

That, as long as we have faithfully preached and acted upon your word,

In John 16:12-15 Jesus continues to share with the Apostles the theology of the Holy Spirit, explaining to them that, 'when the Spirit of truth comes, he will lead you to the complete truth.' The Spirit will also glorify Jesus. Jesus also reminds the Apostles (as John does at the end of his Gospel) that there is so much more Jesus could tell them, but they are not ready for everything as 'it would be too much for you now,' hence the need of the Holy Spirit, by which time the Apostles will have experienced the death, resurrection, and ascension of the Lord.

You are the Third Person of the Blessed Trinity.

You are the Spirit of truth, love and holiness,

proceeding from the Father and the Son, and equal to Them in all things.

I adore You and love You with all my heart.

Teach me to know and to seek God, by whom and for whom I was created.

Give me compunction and patience, and do not let me fall into sin.

We have a few Saints we can mention today, firstly Saints Nereus and Achilleus, who were soldiers in the Roman army where they helped carry out the persecution of Christians. We are not told how they were converted, only that it was a 'miracle of faith.' After this miracle, they threw down their weapons and escaped from their camp, discarding armour and arms as they went toward their new life in Christ. As participants in the persecution, they knew perhaps better than any other Christian what pain awaited them. Faith, however, had triumphed over fear of death and the victory of martyrdom was the sweetest the had ever known.

And our other Saint today is Saint Pancras. Legend tells us he was born at the end of the third century and brought up by an uncle in Rome after the death of his parents. Both he and his uncle became Christians. Saint Pancras was beheaded in 304 during Diocletian's persecution. He was only 14 years old. Pancras is especially venerated in England because Augustine of Canterbury dedicated his first church to Pancras and his relics were presented as a gift to the king of Northumberland. His name was given to an area of London, which in turn gives it's name to the busy International Railway station. He is Patron Saint of children, young people, jobs, and health.
