Friday May 14th, 2021, The Feast of St. Matthias, Apostle

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

Today we have Feast day readings from St. Matthias, but to stay with the plot, in our weekday readings the night before his crucifixion, the Lord has been reminding the Apostles that he is going to suffer, and that they will suffer persecution too. Well in Acts 18:9-18 today, the Lord reminds Paul that he would suffer for him, actually speaking to him in a vision. This comes to light with some of the Jews had trying to bring him Paul before the local Roman tribunal, just as the Jews had done with Jesus. But Gallio, the proconsul would have nothing to do with their legal quibbles and sends them out, with their frustration being taken out on poor Sosthenes, the Synagogue Official, who gets beaten up for his pains. Once again, in John 16:20-23 the Lord reminds the Apostles, and each one of us, that our sorrows will be turned to joy, 'You are sad now, but I shall see you again, and your hearts will be full of joy.'

And, as I said, today we celebrate the Feast of St. Matthias. According to our first reading today 'Acts of Apostles 1:21–26, Saint Matthias was a disciple chosen by the apostles as a replacement for Judas Iscariot after the latter's betrayal of Jesus Christ. It was important that the community endured even after the crucifixion to spread the Christian faith all around the world, and it was crucial that the number of apostles remained 12, as 12 was the number of tribes of Israel and a twelfth apostle was required for the coming of the new Israel. Jesus himself chose the original 12 apostles, and the rest of the apostles chose Saint Matthias after the Ascension. They cast their votes through lots and selected Matthias. There is no further information about him in the New Testament. It is believed that Matthias placed his faith in Jesus Christ above everything else and was present with the other apostles at the Pentecost. He embraced all the teachings of Jesus and sacrificed his life for the service of the Lord, even after being persecuted by many. He also worked many miracles in the name of Lord Jesus, which converted many to the Christian faith. He is a patron of carpenters, tailors, and those who are affected by smallpox.

O Glorious Saint Matthias,

in God's design it fell upon you

to take the place of the unfortunate Judas who betrayed his Master.

You were selected by the twofold sign

of the uprightness of your life and the call of the Holy Spirit.

Obtain for us the grace to practice the same uprightness of life

and to be called by that same Spirit to wholehearted service of the Church.

Then after a life of zeal and good works let us be ushered into your company in heaven to sing forever the praises of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Amen.

I sing psalms, hymns and spiritual songs

With thankfulness in my heart to God

Everything I say and everything I do is done for Jesus my Lord

In all I do, I give thanks to God the Father through Jesus.

I thank God, that God has chosen me.
