In our final two extracts from St. Paul speaking to the Corinthians Paul continues to oppose his detractors. For the Corinthians wisdom by worldly standards was very important - especially for one who claimed to be an apostle. In II Corinthians 11:18, 21-30 Paul demonstrates that he is a descendant of Abraham and a servant of Christ, who has worked hard, experienced prison, beatings, shipwrecks, brigands, and many other dangers. His apparent 'weakness' as perceived by the community in Corinth is really his strength before God. *'If I am to boast, then let me boast of my own feebleness.'*

*Lord,*

*May my heart be ready and open to receive Your Word.*

*I pray that the ground of my heart is fertile and ripe to implement and multiply Your Word.*

*Lord, I pray that Your Word pierces my ears and satisfies my thirst and hunger for You.*

*Lord, let me not boast in you*

*and in Your goodness, Your greatness, Your mercy and Your kindness.*

*Through the intercession of St. Paul, and*

*Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.*

For our last two extracts from the Sermon on the Mount, we are given some practical advice concerning the pursuit of Christian holiness. In a very familiar passage, Matthew 6:19-23, we are famously told to not store up treasures on earth, but *'store up treasures for yourselves in heaven... For where your treasure is, so will your heart be also.'* Jesus adds a paragraph in which he asks us to have spiritual eyes, filled with light, in order that we can have a true spiritual vision, then, *'your whole body will be filled with light.'*

*King Jesus, rich in Heavenly treasures,*

*You Who chose to embrace earthly poverty,*

*Now look at Your eternal glory!*

*Riches alone will not lead us to heaven,*

*Poverty being the road to eternal life.*

*Teach me to embrace a life of poverty,*

*To endure with the bare necessities.*

*If an over-abundance arrives my way,  
Send Your needy children to gather it.  
Enrich my soul with Heavenly treasures,  
Withdrawing its desires for earthly goods.  
I trust in Your spiritual providence!  
Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.*

Well, we've stayed in Europe for our G7 not-in-the-English-language walks on The Prom so for our final, gloriously sunny Friday, we are going to head off to Africa, although via Europe - Austria to be precise. Today's listen is going to be 'Impempe Yomlingo' a retelling of Mozart's 'The Magic Flute'

using the basic plot and tunes from the opera, but with lyrics in Xhosa, which is a Nguni Bantu language and one of the official languages of South Africa and Zimbabwe, as well as English, and a few other languages and dialects thrown in for good measure. Mozart's score is reorchestrated for marimbas, drums and township percussion, and the musical, set in contemporary South Africa, reinterprets the story from a South African perspective, telling of Prince Tamino's quest to rescue Pamina (both of them are Xhosa-speaking teenagers), daughter of the Queen of the Night, from the Priest of the Sun. It's certainly a jazzy, swingy listen, and should have me dancing down the prom, even if, despite having a working knowledge of 'The Magic Flute,' I haven't a clue what is going on!
