Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

And a beautiful weekend it promises to be!

And so in Exodus 12:37-42 the actual Exodus begins, with the Israelites marching out of Egypt after their so many hundreds of years in exile – four hundred and thirty-eight to be precise. Everything had to be done in a hurry, but they were being guided by their God. And once again, the Scriptures remind them that the Exodus must be kept as a celebration, *'The night, when the Lord kept vigil to bring them out of the land of Egypt, must be kept as a vigil on honour of the Lord of all their generations,'* which, of course, it still is.

The same Pharisees who had been arguing with Jesus about the Sabbath in Matthew 12:14-21 began to plot against him. The Gospel at this point reminds us that Jesus' ministry, in particular his miracles of healing, are fulfilling the prophecies of Isaiah; *'Here is my servant whom I have sent... in his name the nations will put their trust,* ' as the Israelites did, for that matter, when they began their Exodus from Egypt.

We beseech thee, Master, to be our helper and protector. Save the afflicted among us; have mercy on the lowly; raise up the fallen; appear to the needy; heal the ungodly; restore the wanderers of thy people; feed the hungry; ransom our prisoners; raise up the sick; comfort the faint-hearted. Lord God, You have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that you hand is leading us and your love supporting us, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

God our Father, you give us our parents to love and care for us. Through them, we come to know how much you love and care for us. Bless them always and keep them close in your love.

God our Father, we ask you to bless, Father Peter, who has been a rock to our school during the year. We give thanks for the many ways in which he helped all of us to come to know you. Bless him and his priestly work in the parish.

God, our Father, we ask you to bless us, the Year Six children, as we leave our school. May we always value the gifts of friendship, care and compassion. May we always be sensitive to the needs of others.

For friendship between nations, for peace and justice in our own country, and that developed countries may not abuse the poverty of other nations.

We make this and all our prayers, through Christ our Lord. Amen.
