Monday July 19th, 2021, Monday in the Sixteenth Week of Ordinary Time Year I

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

I hope everyone is keeping safe and well, and following all the guidance we receive to overcome these strange times, and continuing to pray for all our needs at this time.

After a beautiful weekend, it looks like a beautiful week! Another early start: 8:30am at the Crematorium followed by 9am mass, then back to the Crem for 11am – along with our Leaver's Assembly this afternoon, so on with the day! We've got Saints and Feasts to celebrate every day this week, including the Lancashire and Cumbrian Martyrs, as well as some Saints we know well, and some not so well.

In Exodus 14:5-18 Pharaoh relented when he saw the Israelites leaving Egypt - it was a massive loss of his work-force. But already the Israelites run into difficulties, as their faith in their God was weak and they were terrified when they saw the huge army coming after them. Immediately they start grumbling at Moses that they would have been left to die in Egypt. But God was with them and would defend them, as he tells Moses, 'And when I have won glory for myself, at the expense of Pharoah and his chariots and the army, the Egyptians will learn that I am the Lord.'

And there is something similar happening in the Gospel, Matthew 12:38-42. The people are looking for a sign that Jesus is indeed from God - they won't accept his words or his miracles as enough, and Jesus tells them, 'It is a wicked generation that asks for a sign.' So Jesus makes reference to the sign of Jonah, who was in the belly of the whale for three days, just as Jesus would be three days in the earth and rise up again. Together let us pray for a deeper faith in the Lord, with the Church's 'Acts of Faith, Hope and Love.

and died for our sins and that he will come
