Anna is one of the Bible's most interesting women, concluding the sextet of named, pious Israelites surrounding the miraculous births of John and Jesus. Led by divine direction, Anna is led to a life in the Temple where she recognises Jesus as the one who would deliver Jerusalem. Anna is the only woman in the New Testament described as a 'prophetess', in a sense out ranking Simeon, and one of the few people to have their tribal lineage mentioned, as we are told she is of the tribe of Asher. The life of Anna the Prophetess is a witness to us that God keeps His promises. *Holy Prophetess Saint Anna, pray for us.*

I was sent a very interesting editorial from The Times this week, headlined 'Christmas Under Covid: Britain's Faith Communities have made immense sacrifices for the public good.' It spoke about how Christian Churches were prepared to close under the first Lockdown, and upon the various degrees of opening, from private prayer to Masses, have closely followed all governmental directives, and have kept as covid safe as possible. '*Faith communities have gone to great lengths since the onset of the* crisis to ensure that their premises are Covid-compliant, and to provide the opportunity for virtual worship are home, ' concluding that 'the sacrifices undergone by the Churches in Britain this year are due not to a wish for a quiet life but to virtue and compassion for fellow citizens... It has been hard for Christians not to gather as congregations in 2020. When they do so this Christmas, socially distanced and wearing masks, they will testify to their faith in God and their commitment to human fellowship. They are owed the respect and gratitude of the nation.' I think that is very true, it has been quite an extraordinary nine months, but as a community we have faced the various changes together, supporting each other and working to do whatever we can to practice and share our faith. We should be grateful for everyone who works to put our covid safe liturgies together, not least the stewards and cleaners who help keep us sanitised and able to open for masses and private prayer on Sundays. On your behalf I would like to thank all our stewards and everyone who has worked tirelessly over these past six months to oversee the health and safety of our church. As your priest I can say Mass regularly for you but I cannot say a Public Mass without stewards on duty. Many thanks to everyone who helps keep the church open.

O God from whom all blessings flow, I turn to you in gratitude for this church of St. Bernadette, for every faithful footstep taken within its walls, and every petition prayed, for every story shared, the ordinary and the extraordinary from generation to generation. Thank you that in the silence of our absence You were still here, as well as with your people. As we now gather in Church slowly but surely once again, grant to us all the wisdom to stay safe, the comfort of your peace and joy in coming home. Let your Spirit flow out of me and all who come here, bringing life, hope and healing to our community. Amen.
