Sunday March 29th, Fifth Sunday in Lent Year A.

Good Morning from St. Bernadette's.

So it is now the fifth Sunday of Lent, and as you will have seen the Gospel is that of Lazarus being raised from the dead. All Jesus' healing miracles have a special resonance at this time, and this miracle is especially emotive as 'Jesus wept'. Please pray for all who are weeping today, perhaps because of the death of loved one, perhaps because of loneliness or fear at this time, perhaps because they are feeling helpless at the present situation. And let us continue to pray that this present crisis will soon be over, and we can live our lives anew. As today's preface to the Eucharistic Prayer puts it:

For as true man he wept for Lazarus his friend, and as eternal God raised him from the tomb, just as, taking pity on the human race, he leads us by sacred mysteries to new life.

When Lazarus walked out of the tomb, bound in his grave clothes, Jesus said, 'Unbind him. Let him go free'.
